He urged the senior teachers and Principals to use patience, intelligence and inspirational treatment of the new teachers. "What we fear is that many of our beginners will be asked to assume the fullburdens of experienced teachers before they are ready for them, that we shall be tempted t go back to the old practice of trying to tell them what to do in every con eivable crisis," the Dean continued

"The changes imply a different apcroach to the whole problem of teach er-training. It was an acute observer who remarked that teacher-training in Ontario has seemed to believe the worst of the prospective teacher and has concerned itself with trying to prevent him from doing stupid and harmful things he might be expected to do. The same observer points out how appallingly easy it is to attain this negative aim by requiring all young teachers to do the same thing in the same way.
