CITY COUNCIL MEETS

The January committee meeting of the Fredericton city council will take place in the mayor's office at the city hall this evening, commencing at eight o'clock. Routine business is scheduled. The regular January meeting will take place on Tuesday evening.

SPOKE AT SAINT JOHN

His Grace Most Rev. J. A. Richardson, archbishop of Fredericton, was the special speaker in St. Bartholomew's church, Coldbrook, on Sunday. On Sunday evening His Grace delivered the sermon in St. Paul's (Valley) church, where the service was conducted by Rev. A. F. Bate, the rector.

GOVERNMENT MEETING

A meeting of the provincial government, the first since before the Christmas holiday season, is scheduled to take place on Wednesday in this city. Premier A. A. Dwyer is expected here tonight or tomorrow, and the other cabinet ministers are expected to arrive in the capital, probably tomorrow.

AGRICULTURAL CONFERENCE

A periodic provincial agricultural conference is scheduled for Jan. 12 to 15 at the agricultural building here, it was announced this morning by J. K. King, deputy minister of agriculture. Federal agricultural officials will be invited to this conference and the general programme of agriculture for the province will be discussed at that time.

SCHOOLS REOPENED

The schools of the city reopened today following the Christmas and New Year's holiday period of two weeks. Children of the graded schools trooped back to school en masse this morning. Sicknesses were rare among the pupils, but several of the teachers were out with illness. Austin Squares temporarily is replacing C. B. Burden at the high school. A slight change has been made in the Morrison's Mills school where the primary grades have been broken into two groups, with Miss Ruth Hanson teaching grades one and two, and Miss Ivy Richards, of this city, engaged as teacher of grades three and four. Miss Lillian Cuming is teacher of grades five and six.

YORK COUNTY COUNCIL MEETS ON TUESDAY

Coun. Frank Coburn is Mentioned For Wardenship

Cold Storage, Abattoir

January Session is Expected to be a Busy One

The January session of the York County Municipal council will commence tomorrow morning at the county court house, with Warden A. Howard Cameron, of Kingsclear presiding. Matters expected to occupy the attention of the council include a proposed new wing to Victoria Public Hospital, establishment of a cold storage and public abattoir, which has been consistently supported by The Daily Mail, tax collections, and direct relief.

Also there is likely to be consideration of the proposal to establish an airport to serve this city and vicinity.

Coun. Frank Coburn of Harvey, a veteran representative at the board, is mentioned as the successor to A. Howard Cameron as warden for the ensuing year. Coun. Coburn represents the parish of Manners-Sutton. The election of the new warden will be the first of business. It has been 15 years since the parish of Manners-Sutton has been honored by the wardenship. Dr. B. H. Dougan, ex-M. P. P., was the last warden from that parish.

GUY D. SCOVIL TAKES OVER NEW DUTIES JAN. 18

New Superintendent of City Schools to Arrive Soon

Has Modern Ideas

How Will These Fit With Antique of the Closed Door?

Guy D. Scovil of Brockville, Ontario, who has recently been imported by the Fredericton Closed Door School Board to take over the duties of superintendent of city schools and secretary of the Closed Door School Board, will arrive here on the 16th instant and will take over his duties on January 18. It is said it is Mr. Scovil's intention to have a Closed Door meeting at which he will outline to the various members, the way things are done in other places. Some on has said that Mr. Scovil has modern ideas in regard to school management and that he intends to introduce these ideas into the Fredericton schools. Some of the present school board, whose most modern ideas go back 40 or 50 years ago, to the days of the old tin dipper and the raised platform, will throw a fit when Mr. Scovil starts talking about new ideas. It is said by those who have discussed the matter with the members of the antiquated Closed Door School Board that they will resent any introduction of modern ideas into our school system. One man has said, "It has always been that way, therefore we intend to have it that way." The idea of keeping children in until 4.30 and five o'clock and of giving a child ten slaps for spelling ten words wrong has been going on for years and it would be treason to do away with such things and pursue modern ideas. It will be interesting to see what kind of a cut and dried report of the doings of the Closed Door School Board which the new secretary will send out. So far as The Daily Mail is concerned we will continue to give the public the information of all that goes on at the school board and will give it as it filters through the Closed Door.

It is Mr. Miquelon's intention to remain in Fredericton for some days, and, if possible, to organize a branch of the lodge in this city.

Wilmot Brotherhood

A Powerful and Constructive Indictment of Indifference to Youth Problems Delivered by Dr. G. C. Cossar

Dr. G. C. Cossar of Glasgow, Scotland, well known philanthropist and owner of the Cossar Farm at Gagetown spoke before the Wilmot Brotherhood yesterday afternoon. Dr. Cossar was reticent in speaking of his activity in helping under-privileged and delinquent boys to find work in the dominions because many of them have been successful and now hold positions of responsibility.

The case of a boy from London whom Dr. Cossar placed upon a farm in Australia was told by the speaker. This boy had had a very bad record at home and after reaching Australia he did not receive proper supervision and started a life of violence and crime. The Australian government blamed Dr. Cossar and refused to allow any more immigration.

After investigating the situation Dr. Cossar received an offer from the Presbyterian Church of Victoria to find work for the boys and keep in contact with them. On the strength of this the government granted a three year period of immigration. The three years passed and there was not one failure to make good by the boys.

The responsibility of bettering the youth problem is not so much the state's as that of the citizens in seeing that courses of industrial training are available for young people.

You cannot take a human problem and solve it by logic alone, said Dr. Cossar, you must use the supernatural element.

"We have got to let Jesus have the key to our souls. We have got to let Him in."

The men who had gathered to hear Dr. Cossar felt that they had heard a vital message from a man of great religious strength. A vote of thanks was moved by W. J. West, seconded by L. C. Young and unanimously carried. The gathering also heard a selection by a quartette composed of F. W. Barker, John Harrison, Vernon Box and F. T. Pridham.

IS COMMUNISM GAINING GROUND IN FREDERICTON?

Communist Meetings Being Held in This City

Guard Against It

Deny Report Communism Active at University of N. B.

Is it a fact that Communism is getting a foothold in Fredericton? It is understood that certain private meetings are being held in houses on the outskirts of the city in which the people, including some of the younger element, are being instructed in the doctrines of Communism. It is said that the disciples of Communism are making an effort to collect adherents to their cause. These are gathered from people, some of whom are on the list of the unemployed and an endeavor is being made to control them by Communists who believe in radical policy and industrial strife. It is up to people to be on their guard against this Communist effort.

At St. Dunstan's church yesterday morning Rev. Dr. J. H. Milligan spoke of the fact that Communism was gaining ground in Canada and stated that it was up to those who wished to preserve the Dominion and to preserve our present system of government to take measures to combat this communist evil, which was bound to destroy church and state. Dr. Milligan took issue with Premier King in remarks which he made a few days ago to a delegation which waited upon him and pointed out the evils of Communism. Dr. Milligan spoke of the number of communist newspapers which are being published and stated that even university professors were engaged in spreading the doctrine of Communism.

The report that Communism is spreading amongst the students at the university here is denied by those who are conversant with the facts. A resident of Ottawa who is in the city at the present time informs The Daily Mail that one would be surprised if he were to go from Fredericton and come in contact with the large Communist element which exists in the capital city of the Dominion. He says that even children in the schools are being taught to scoff at our institutions of church and state, and to blaspheme God and denounce the authorities who are at the head of our Empire.

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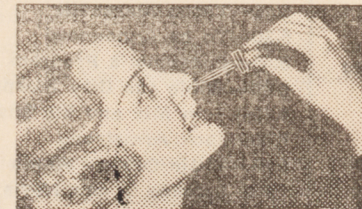
