

# City Council Moves to Abolish Fredericton Police Commission

## Advocates Change in Method of Payment Of Police Magistrate

Mayor and Aldermen Delmas Olts and David McCaughey Absent; City Treasurer Fred I. Haviland to be Reprimanded for Exceeding Holiday Period

Renewed attacks on the Fredericton Police Commission and the system whereby the remuneration received by the Police Magistrate of this city depends on the amount of crime, featured the regular monthly meeting of the City Council held last evening in the Council Chambers. On motion of Ald. B. R. Ross, seconded by Ald. T. Earle Doohan, it was decided to take action once more in an effort to abolish the Commission.

Furthermore, it was unanimously decided to send a resolution to the Attorney General of this province, J. B. McNair, suggesting that all magistrates of the lower courts of New Brunswick be paid on a salary basis, as are the jurists of the higher courts, instead of on a commission basis, as they are at present.

The auditor's report for the month of September showed an expenditure of \$33,455.71.

The amount of taxes collected in September, 1937, was \$7,462.74, as compared with \$6,774.92 for September, 1936.

The matter of the request of G. N. Babbitt, Toronto, that the city purchase from him the lot separating the end of Union Street from University Avenue was referred to the Town Planning Commission.

### Tax Exemption Granted

On motion of Ald. Murray Hagerman, seconded by Ald. R. A. McMillan it was decided to grant to the Hartt Boot and Shoe Co., Ltd., a complete freedom from assessment for city taxes during the next ten years, and free water during that same time, a renewal of the grant which has been in effect for the past 20 years.

In giving a report of the 31st annual meeting of the New Brunswick Union of Municipalities, Ald. F. S. Mundie acclaimed very highly the address on Municipalities and Maritime Rights by Hon. Dr. A. P. Patterson, Minister of Education, Federal and Municipal Relations for N. B. The report was accepted on motion of Ald. W. Raymond Crewdson, seconded by Ald. McMillan.

After briefly reviewing the history of the bill to abolish the Fredericton Police Commission presented to the House during the last session of the New Brunswick Legislative Assembly, the subsequent resignation of seven of the aldermen, and their unopposed re-election by the citizens of this city, Ald. Ross moved that the city solicitor, Peter J. Hughes, K.C., be instructed to take whatever action

is deemed necessary to abolish the commission. The motion was seconded by Ald. T. Earle Doohan.

### Standing Vote

The motion was passed on a standing vote, Aldermen B. R. Ross, T. Earle Doohan, W. Raymond Crewdson, Ivan McKnight, R. A. McMillan and Murray E. Hagerman rising in favor of the motion, Ald. F. S. Mundie alone remaining seated. His Worship Mayor G. Willard Kitchen, Ald. David McCaughey and Ald. Delmas Olts were absent, while Deputy Mayor Ray T. Forbes did not register his vote, because he was presiding.

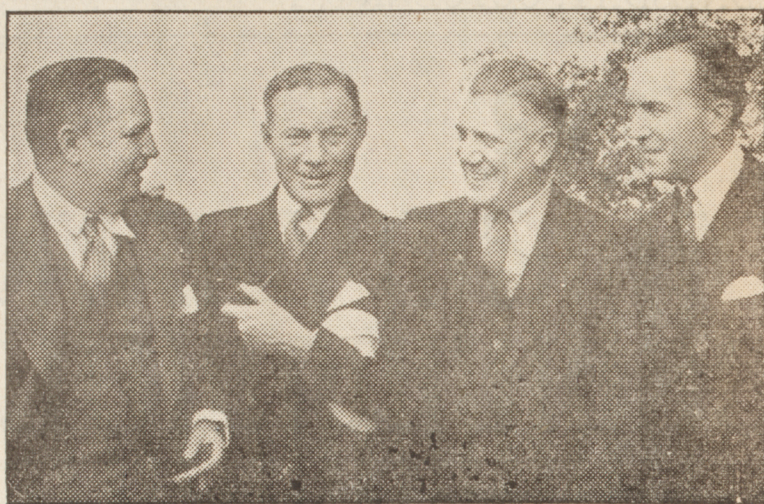
In discussing the bill presented to the Legislature at the last session, Ald. Doohan stated that the aldermen went to the Legislature at that time to discuss the situation as regards the Police Commission but were unable to give particulars regarding the way the Commission was conducted, as it was a closed door affair. The bills of the administration of justice department of the city are mounting, yet we can't do anything about it, the alderman stated.

### More Crime, More Salary

Emphasizing that the more crime there is in the city, the greater is the salary paid to the police magistrate, Ald. Doohan stated that arrangements should be made so that no one will benefit from the quantity of crime in a city. He therefore moved that a resolution be forwarded by letter to the Department of the Attorney General of this province, recommending, if the Attorney General thought it advisable, that police magistrates in New Brunswick be put on a straight salary basis, and that all fees go to their respective places. The alderman explained that it cannot be expected that this would be done for Fredericton alone, and stated that this is the reason why the motion asks for salaries for magistrates of all the lower courts of this province.

## THREE WITNESSES ON STAND YES'DAY AFTERNOON IN DRUNKEN DRIVING CASE

Chief of Police Jones for the Prosecution, Two Witnesses for Defence; Kenneth Griffiths, Charged With Having Care and Control of Car While Drinking

### LIKELY GO TO JURY TODAY

One witness for the prosecution and two for the defence were on the stand yesterday afternoon, in the case of the Crown vs. Kenneth Griffiths, who is charged with having care and control of a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor. Chief of Police Nathaniel Jones, informant in the case, was the first witness called when the court resumed its sitting at 2.30 in the afternoon. Other witnesses were George F. Forest and Harry Allen both called for the defence.

The evidence of Chief Jones was largely a corroboration of that of Officer Osborne Brown of the City Police who testified in the morning.

Forest, the first witness for the defence, testified that he had been in the cells in the City Hall when Griffiths was brought in by the police. He said that the accused seemed sober at the time, and that he talked to him for a long while before they retired.

Harry Allen, the second witness stated that he met Griffiths in front of a restaurant on King Street, and that they went up to the room of Ellis McLean. He later admitted in cross examination that he shared the room spoken of.

### Refused Drink

He said that the time was around noon. Later they went up to a service station on York street and looked at a car which they considered buying. While there, he said that McLean offered both he and the accused a drink out of a bottle of which the seal had not been broken but that neither of the three took a drink. They went up the Woodstock Road in the car to try it out, he said, and then returned to the service station where they got in the Griffiths car again and drove over to Devon where they got a Miss Jones. The witness stated that Griffiths was then sober and that he had not seen him take a drink.

### No Drinking

They went into another restaurant on King Street, he said, to have supper. The restaurant was on the block below the first one mentioned. After supper he left the accused, and at the time he left, he stated that he had not seen the accused take a drink and that he was sober.

In cross-examination by A. R. Murray, Crown prosecutor, the witness retracted his statement that McLean had offered them a drink at the service station, and stated that it had been in their room at the restaurant.

The witness admitted that he had been intoxicated before now, but declared that he had been sober that

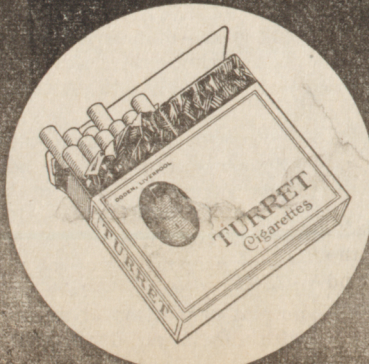
