AWAIT PARADE

LONDON, March 23-There is now every indication that the hears of British girls are going to flutter like flags when the Dominion and Empire troops go marching past in the coronation street procession on May 12.

Advance reports are that these troops have been picked, not only for skill in taking a machine gun apart -as if that mattered-but also for height, handsome appearance and general ability to make an impres-

There are reports, even, that all this has been deliberate; that the plan is to prove to English girls that Empire manhood is something to be desired and that a home somewhere outside the British Isles might not

To make it perfect there are reports that, with only a few exceptions, the contingent of 150 picked men from Australia, already on their way to London, are single men.

Canada is sending along between 300 and 400 men, also most carefully lows in a variety of color schemes, selected, including a detachment of red-coated Royal Mounted Police. New Zealand is sending 50 officers and men from the army and air force and 50 from the navy. The Union of South Africa military forces will be represented by 100 of the best.

The real color and pageantry, however, will be in the Indian contingent which will be thoroughly representative of Indian army life. There will be a complete gathering of British. Punjabs, Sikhs, Rajputs, Musulmans, Hindus, Pathans, Kaimkhanis, Burmese, Garhwalis and others.

Flood Still Causing Anxiety in England

LONDON, March 22 - Floods are still causing anxiety in certain porions of England although the water has dropped two feet from its highest peak. The weather is now fine and if this continues there should be a continued drop. Spring tides are still causing trouble at Denver and on a stretch of 22 miles on the Old Bedford River. Army wireless posts have been established on this stretch.

EDMONTON, March 23-The Peo ple's League of Alberta which is calculated to have the best chance of defeating the Aberhart Social Credit Government at the polls next election, has suddenly increased political activity with a regular radio programme. It went on the air for

the first time last week. Word has gone out among the members that an election may be expected within six months.
