### BRITISH GIRLS AWAIT PARADE

LONDON, March 23—There is now every indication that the hordes of British girls are going to flutter like flags when the Dominion and Empire troops go marching past in the coronation street procession on May 12.

Advance reports are that these troops have been picked, not only for skill in taking a machine gun apart—as if that mattered—but also for height, handsome appearance and general ability to make an impression.

There are reports, even, that all this has been deliberate; that the plan is to prove to English girls that Empire manhood is something to be desired and that a home somewhere outside the British Isles might not be so bad.

To make it perfect there are reports that, with only a few exceptions, the contingent of 150 picked men from Australia, already on their way to London, are single men.

Canada is sending along between 300 and 400 men, also most carefully selected, including a detachment of red-coated Royal Mounted Police. New Zealand is sending 50 officers and men from the army and air force and 50 from the navy. The Union of South Africa military forces will be represented by 100 of the best.

The real color and pageantry, however, will be in the Indian contingent which will be thoroughly representative of Indian army life. There will be a complete gathering of British, Punjabs, Sikhs, Rajputs, Muslims, Hindus, Pathans, Kalmkhanis, Burmese, Garhwalis and others.

### Flood Still Causing Anxiety in England

LONDON, March 22 — Floods are still causing anxiety in certain portions of England although the water has dropped two feet from its highest peak. The weather is now fine and if this continues there should be a continued drop. Spring tides are still causing trouble at Denver and on a stretch of 22 miles on the Old Bedford River. Army wireless posts have been established on this stretch.

EDMONTON, March 23—The People's League of Alberta which is calculated to have the best chance of defeating the Aherhart Social Credit Government at the polls next election, has suddenly increased political activity with a regular radio programme. It went on the air for the first time last week.

Word has gone out among the members that an election may be expected within six months.

### HAPPY EASTER PARADE

#### Directions for Making an Easter Menagerie

For an Easter Menagerie—take assorted candy eggs, gumdrops, jelly beans, candy corn and marshmallows; add toothpicks and whole cloves and assemble these materials according to the direction sets attached. By using gumdrops and eggs in assorted sizes, any one favor can be made in three or four different heights. A rabbit or a chicken, for instance, may be a half foot tall or no bigger than a half inch. Ducks may be five inches long from bill-tip to tail, or no bigger than a jelly bean. By making big and little fellows in a variety of color schemes, no two favors need look exactly alike. Get the knack of a design, and in less than an hour you will have a whole regiment of funny fellows on your surprised hands.

#### Chickens

Materials: round top, flat-bottom gumdrops in three sizes (yellow, red, orange, green), toothpicks and cloves.

Directions: To make one chicken requires one large yellow gumdrop and two smaller ones (either of yellow or a contrasting color), two toothpicks and two whole cloves. Run a piece of toothpick into a small yellow gumdrop, (No. 1) and then fasten this to one side of the flat bottom of the big gumdrop, (No. 2). Cut the second small gumdrop in half, as shown by the dotted line (No. 3).

Take the round bottom half and cut it across (No. 4). The two half circles make the chicken's feet. Stick a toothpick leg into each foot and fasten them to the body (No. 5). The top of the second small gummie is a wee tail. Fasten it on with a toothpick (No. 6). Add whole cloves for eyes, one on each side of the chicken's head. Now pinch the bottom edge of the gumdrop head, right where the bill should be. Pinch hard and a bill grows between your thumb and finger. The bill looks best when outlined with a thin strip of gumdrop (No. 7).

For a large chicken use an Easter egg for the body in place of the big gumdrop. The largest size gumdrop makes the head and a gumdrop of medium size makes the tail and feet. Add these parts exactly as described for the all-gumdrop chicken (No. 7).

For the tiniest chicken use the smallest size gumdrop for the body. The head is the top of another small gumdrop, the bottom part is used for feet and tail. Cut the gumdrop like No. 8. Part one makes the chick's head. The remaining circle (part 2) is cut as shown by the dotted lines (No. 9). The two outside pieces make the feet, half of the inside strip does for tail, the other half outlines the bill. For these tiny chicks the eyes are of clove stem rather than the large blossom end. Push in a clove, part way, then snip off the clove end.

### RESUME OF SPRING FASHIONS

#### Velvet and Many Other Trimmings

Fashions this spring have much that is new and exciting about them. There's something in the air that has put all the designers on their metal. They have outdone themselves in creating beautiful, elegant, wearable clothes.

The cycle is complete and we are back again in a period of trimmings. Throughout the mode, but especially for evening, applied decoration, such as embroidery, beading, spangles, paillettes, encrustations and hand-work of all kinds, is almost as widely used as it was before the war.

The silhouette adheres to the natural figure, with normal waistlines, smooth, slightly rounded shoulders and molded upper stratum. The figure, as a matter of fact, should look corseted. The clothes are basically simple and it is upon this simplicity heightened by accessories, trimmings rich fabrics and color that fashion has relied for its newest aspects.

Suits head the list for spring. They show an amazing versatility. You'll find suits not only in the classic tweeds and men's wear fabrics, but suits in old-fashioned fabrics, such as covert and serge, suits in stiff silks like bengaline, and silk suits both printed and plain. Many of them have contrasting jackets. Jackets are mostly short, many of them collarless or buttoned high with sharp revers. Among the exceptions to the short jacket suit, the pre-war reefer suit with full boxy coat must be mentioned.

Suits share in the mode for trimming. Many designers, among them Helen Cookman and Creed, are using velvet trim in collars, pipings and bandings. In instances, velvet blouses match the trim. This is definitely news for spring. Pockets receive a great deal of attention. At times, they are the only trimming on an otherwise plain suit.

In dresses, necklines are lower, skirts are shorter and sleeves usually plain. The high spots in dresses are boleros, decorated in numerous ways, and prints. It is definitely a printed season. The prints range from small monotone motifs to huge multi-colored designs for evening. Medium patterns in bright colors on neutral grounds are the favorites for daytime. The season blazes with the color of these prints.

But color is not limited alone to prints. Black, beige and navy are contrasted with unusual color combinations.

binations, sometimes as many as four in one costume. Fresh greens, red, orange, yellow, pink, coral and turquoise are favored for these bright touches.

Many of the clothes are so simple that accessories have reached a peak of importance. Jewels, real jewels, have come into their own against the background of this simplicity. Designers are even creating dresses, called 'Jewel Dresses,' as settings for the scintillating, brilliant jewelry that is so much in vogue. Flowers are everywhere. It is newest to wear two boutonnieres, one on each lapel of your suit. The lady slipper orchids the cypripediums, look especially smart with tailored suits. Try also a jewelled clip on each lapel. Another new way to wear your orchids is squarely under the skin.

Hats range from flower pots full of flowers (velvet of course), tilted on one side, to the wide broad-brimmed or shallow-crowned, narrow-brimmed sailors. Many hats are velvet trimmed and all are extreme, almost too silly for words, but they seem to fit the clothes. Romantic, saucy, pretty and provocative and always feminine.

Gloves deserve a whole chapter in themselves. Not only do their colors add to the 'Gaiety of Fashions,' but they mirror fashion trends as clearly as clothes. Femininity is uppermost. It is reflected in the handsewn details and stylized designs of the new costume gloves. Gloves purposely slenderize the hands. Smooth leathers, like glace kid are back again for the same reason.

Fashions for evening, in contrast to daytime, are elaborate, very formal and décolleté. Skirts just touch the floor, although you'll see some of the new ankle-length dance frocks introduced at the Paris midseason openings. The silhouette is very feminine and, in general, can be divided into two definite types: the full-skirted, and the simple and sophisticated. The fragile fabrics, the chiffons, organdies, summer velvets, laces and nets, are interpreted in romantic and youthful costumes. Rich heavy fabrics, the prints, crepes, satins and laces and brocades for the Coronation, lend themselves to the slim, sophisticated gown. The evening picture is a riot of color.

In evening wraps, velvet predominates. It is fashioned into capes of all lengths, into short, three-quarter and full-length wraps. Crush-resistant velvet, Crystelle and the fur velvet.

### HOW THE EASTER BRIDE SHOULD ENTERTAIN THEM

Ever so many of you have asked for suggestions for entertaining the bridesmaids at a bridal luncheon or evening party. Easter and Easter weddings are surely in the air. And never have we seen such glittering, shimmering, delightful table decorations and favors for just such a party.

#### The Bride Entertains

If the bridal party is small, the guests may be seated. A table decorated with white bells, orange blossoms or Easter lilies and clear transparent cellophane is tremendously appealing. The centre piece is made of a clear glass bowl in which are placed the bells and the flowers. Cellophane may be gathered around the base of the flowers and bells filling the low bowl with glittering fluff. Cellophane circles pasted around the bottoms of the bells and extending one half inch beyond the edges will give a touch of gay sparkle to the table.

Miniature white crepe paper bells trimmed with crepe paper orange blossoms or Easter lilies and white satin ribbons act as place card favors and match the larger bells that make the centrepiece. The cards are attached to the bells with ribbon.

#### Gifts form Centrepiece

The boxes which contain the brides gifts to her attendants make the foundation of the centrepiece for one bridesmaids' luncheon. White boxes of uniform shape and size are wrapped with appropriately designed silver and white wrapping paper and fastened at either end with silver wedding bell seals.

The boxes are piled up to form a series of little steps, even if you are giving such tiny articles as pins or handkerchiefs, put them in boxes large enough to make the centrepiece attractive.

#### Miniature Bridal Party

On the steps stand the bridal party one bridesmaid being attached to each gift package. They are very easy to construct, cone-shaped drinking cups upturned make the foundation. A lollypop face seal pasted to an oval card with a wire between and a crepe paper wrapped wire for the arms complete the doll. They are dressed in crepe paper. A circle with a wedge-shaped piece cut out forms the skirt, similar smaller circles are used for the bertha that takes the place of a waist and for the hat. Narrow satin ribbons trim the hat and form sash ends.

A tiny garland, made by wrapping a piece of spool wire with a narrow strip of fringed crepe paper is held by the different dolls to form an aisle for the bride and groom who stand on the topmost box. A similar larger wreath entwines the lower boxes and softens the edge as well as giving a pleasing bit of color against the white tablecloth.

The bridesmaids may be dressed all in the same color or two each of several different pastel shades.

#### Buffet Refreshments

If there are too many guests to be seated comfortably at the table a buffet arrangement may be used. A formal centrepiece similar to that of a tea is best for this type of luncheon. Stately tapers in an oval ring of Easter lilies and baby's breath makes an attractive centrepiece. There may be, heaped in the centre, boxes of wedding cake or perhaps if the bridesmaids' presents are small, the presents can be arranged in the oval of the flowers. If each box is tied with a fluffy gauze bow it softens the very stiff and formal effect of the tapers and the lilies.

#### Wedding Bells

Crepe paper wedding bells (three in a group) may be hung over the table to give the proper air of festivity. They are grouped together and tied with satin ribbon, the ends of which are left streaming down and decorated with little bunches of orange blossoms at the ends and in the middle.

Another sparkling table decoration for the bride's table is a large heart made of cellophane and smaller editions can be used for favors.

#### Candle Ruffles

To dress up the candles, a ruffle of cellophane can be made very quickly. It makes a charming base and adds sparkle to the table. Incidentally, it is a new idea to have the candles informally arranged instead of the usual formal way. That is to put a group at one end of the table, either two or a number, using a large one in the middle and smaller sizes on each side. The candles can also be placed at two corners, diagonal to each other, in groups of two

or three. This makes an interesting table and with the cellophane ruffles—why it is gorgeous.

#### Favors

A bag of mints tied in cellophane with an Easter lily peeking out of the top or a little bride and groom on top makes an appropriate and attractive favor for the brides' luncheon.

There are many place cards that can be bought which carry out the idea of the wedding.

### LARGE NUMBER APPLICATIONS FOR NATURALIZATION

EDMONTON, March 23—Demand for naturalization, much greater in Alberta since advent of Social Credit, is reviving again following a slump during November and December. In January, 178 foreign-born residents made applications.

Prospects of Social Credit dividends—and to a lesser extent desire for protection against deportation—resulted in an unprecedented wave of applications starting early in 1935 and reaching a peak in September, 1936, when 330, an all-time record, was made.

In August and October residents made 260 and 219 applications, respectively, but following the September record, applications fell off to 116 in November and 87 in December.
