## Bills

(Continued from Page Eight)  
"In case a person made liable by any of the provisions of this Act to the payment of taxes assessed in respect of the property or income of another pays such taxes, whether voluntarily or not, he may recover the amount paid from such other person in an action of debt in any court of competent jurisdiction.

"The Town Council are hereby authorized to make such by-laws and ordinances for the assessing, levying and collecting of all taxes ordered by the Town Council as they may, from time to time, deem necessary and expedient, and also are empowered to make by-laws for the government of the assessors, and to order and direct the mode in which they shall execute their duties, and for any breach thereof, impose penalties, not in any case exceeding forty dollars for each offence; provided that, no by-law or ordinance so made shall be repugnant to any part of or inconsistent with the spirit and meaning of this Act."

## Silver Fox Found

Deputy Game Warden Charles Hayward, of Lincoln, while on patrol on Monday found a silver fox which had evidently been dead for two or three days. There are no marks of identification nor where there any signs to indicate how the fox had been killed, or placed in the position where found. A slight snow storm had covered up all tracks leading to the location.

The fox was evidently ranch raised, but inquiries made at the various ranches in the locality failed to find anyone who had lost such an animal. The pelt will be held at the office of the Chief Game Warden for a few days in order to give fox ranchers an opportunity to inspect same.

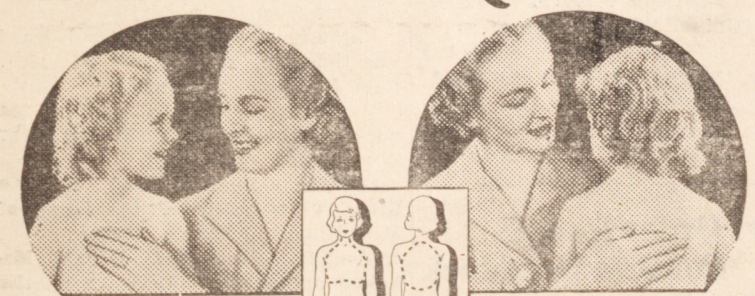
