The same night, Kostelanetz planed to the West Coast. He arrived there Saturday afternoon at which time he found the arrangement completed. He rehearsed Miss Pons with his orchestra and, two hours after his arrival, the song was recorded on the sound track.

The entire task, from completion of the composition to arranging, rehearsing, and the finished product, required little more than 24 hours.
