SPECIFICATIONS TO CONTRACTORS SENT YESTERDAY

of Six Bridges in New Brunswick

Extensive Program

ders Closes on April 10th

Specifications in connection with bridges to be constructed in the province this year by the Department of Public Works were mailed to contractors yesterday. Full details of the proposed projects were included in the documents and all those tender ing on the work must file their bids on or before April 10th. The plans call for the construction of 6 bridges, and is one of the most extensive programs carried out by the bridge The first stamps with the portrait division of the Public Works Depart-

> The bridges will be constructed at Hendry, Emtree and Grant's Brook n Gloucester county; Two Brooks Victoria county; Rockland, Carleton county; and Dingee, Queens county. The estimate costs of the projects have not been announced.

The date on which the successful tenders will be awarded was not announced by G. Barbour, deputy minister of public works, but it is likely that it will as soon after April 10th as is possible. Work will be commenced as soon as weather and ground conditions permit.

Provisions in the specifications stipulate that, insofar as it is possible, contractors will make every effort to keep the work from interfering with the passage of traffic in the respective areas concerned.

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
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
