Enjoyable Musical Programme Adds To Evening

The Local Teachers' Association held its first meeting of the season in the High School Auditorium, Friday, Nov. 12, with the president, O. V. B. Miller, in the chair.

After a short business period, the president introduced the speaker of the evening, Dr. Fletcher Peacock, who spoke on the theme, "Building Up the Teaching Profession." "Our idea of education," he said, "has broadened and is more inclusive now than formerly. It is the birthright of every Canadian child to receive at least a High School education, which has a definite relation to his living conditions. In order to make this possible there is a definite challenge for professional improvement. First a system must be planned that will give the teachers a better average economic reward through the Province. This will necessitate a reorganization of the rural school system with a larger unit of administration. The Department of Education is promoting several activities to encourage professional improvement. They offer first of all the facilities of a library of several hundred volumes for circulation among the teachers. There also has been appointed a supervisor of Home Economics and Women's Work to support this work in the schools. The cultural side of education both in schools and in community groups is being promoted by Mrs. Haynes, who is also introducing the activity program in school work. Finally, the Youth Training Plan aims at training unemployed young people for some useful line of work. In closing, Dr. Peacock requested suggestions from the teachers for the further promotion of these departments.

An enjoyable feature of the evening's program was a group of four numbers rendered by the Cecelian Singers, under the direction of Robert C. Bayley. The group included "Whate'er May Vex and Grieve You," "Deck the Hall," "Love Has Eyes," and "At Dawning." The chorus responded to the hearty applause with "Drink To Me Only with Thine Eyes." For the first time the Association had the pleasure of hearing Miss Marjorie Hicks, of the staff of the Provincial Normal School. Miss Hicks entertained the audience with two readings, "Homework" and "Something On My Chest." Following the program a social hour was enjoyed in the gymnasium, where refreshments were served under the direction of the social committee.

PROGRESS ON BRIDGE

The work of pouring concrete on pier 8 of the new Canadian National Railways bridge, is progressing rapidly, all but the top of the pier now being completed. The structure is expected to be finished by the middle or end of next week, which will allow the Hamilton Bridge Co., Ltd., contractors for the superstructure, to go ahead with their work of laying the steel floor sections from piers 9 to 8. Already about two-thirds of the floor sections have been laid on the wooden falsework. Meanwhile the company is going on with the riveting of the trusses of span 9.
