Sir James Dunn Proposes His Land for Game Refuge

Recent announcement in the Royal Gazette that 9,671 acres of land situated in the parishes of New Bandon, Bathurst and Paquetville, Gloucester County, has been created a game refuge by the government, has an interesting story behind it.

The land involved had been granted in various parcels to Sir James H. Dunn, formerly of Bathurst but now prominent in the industrial life of England.

Recently Sir James wrote Hon. F. W. Pirie, Minister of Lands and Mines, that he was greatly interested in the conservation of all game and wild life in New Brunswick and proposed that the property should be made into a game refuge and that two caretakers be maintained or the men should be appointed game wardens.

The offer was accepted by the Minister and as a result an order in Council was passed establishing the refuge from April 1, 1937.

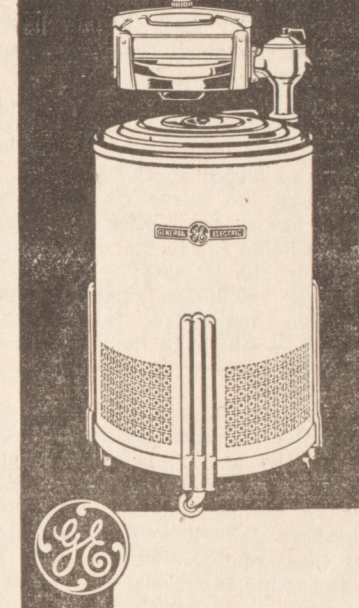
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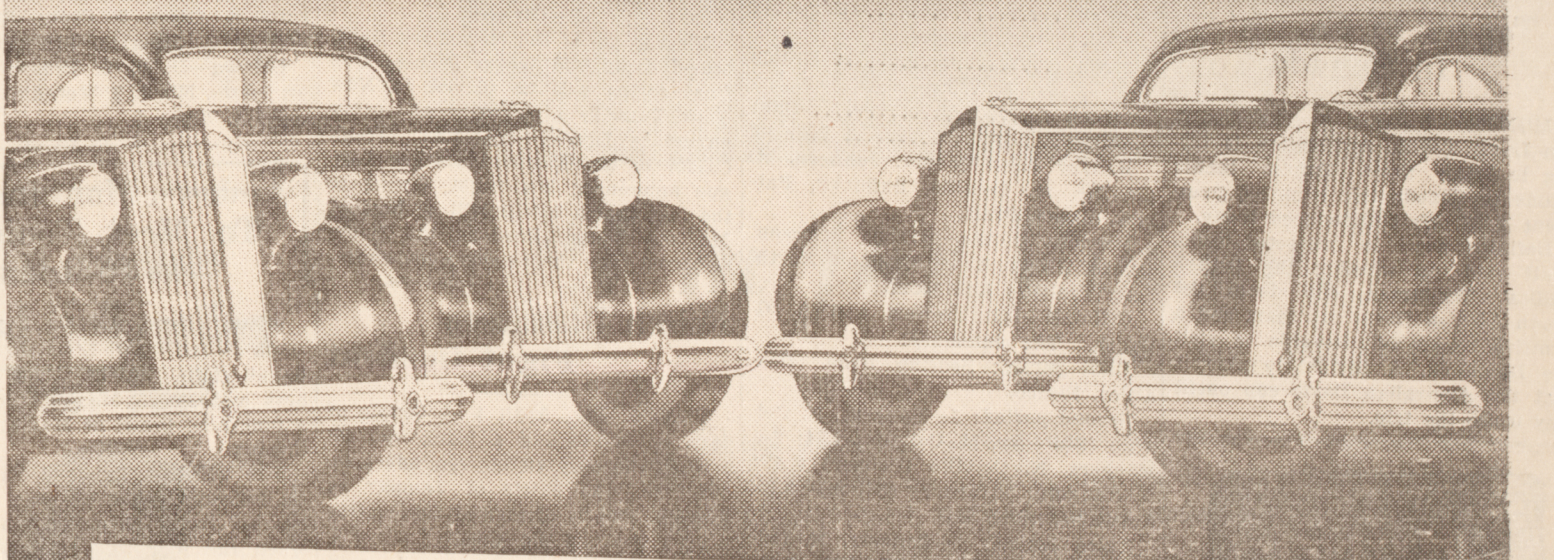
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
