## J. L. Howatt Addresses Science Club

With an attendance of almost thirty members and guests, the club met at the home of J. Brown Maxwell and listened to an address on 'Plant Breeding' by J. L. Howatt, assistant plant pathologist at the plant pathology laboratory at the Experimental Farm. After reading the minutes of the preceding meeting, Melvin Moore, proposed at the previous meeting, was duly elected to membership in the club. Before opening the meeting, the president, R. P. Gorham bade a hearty welcome to a visitor and charter member of the organization, Henry Bailey, who had frequently addressed the club and had formerly done much to forward our group. Mr. Howatt, upon being introduced to the club, said that plant life was affected by disease just as animal life, divided into the same classes as to cause: Bacteria, virus, fungi, parasites and insects. Man was forced to combat these competitors for his food supply so sought to find plants resistant to these diseases, failing that, to breed in resistance by crossing varieties producing most with varieties resisting most. Here he explained that this crossing was done by dusting pollen from 'X' plant on pistil of 'Y' plant as well as pollen from 'Y' on pistil of 'X'. The resulting degree of resistance was not identical and further crossing was carried on with the results being carefully compared to produce the desired result. Plants have various natural protections, e.g. the spines that are the rudiments of leaves through which transpiration is exceedingly small, so fitting the cactus for life in arid climates. The smear of waxy coating covering apples protects the fruit against decay and the bark of trees and shrubs serves to protect against similar invasion. At our Experimental Farm most work is concerned with developing immune potatoes, possibly our most important local crop. Much progress is being made in developing a potato with much immunity, good shape, colour and a large yield per hill. The shape is of more than esthetic value, for a deep-set eye is wasteful by entailing much paring to prepare the 'spud' for the pot. Colour has its effect on the market as red potatoes will not sell at all in some places. That results from such plant breeding must be slow to get, the speaker illustrated by explaining that of 30,000 crosses made last summer only about 100 were suitable to make further experiments with this summer. A vote of thanks was moved by Mr. Prince, seconded by R. A. Smith and was presented by the president as chairman who said that all must now see what a tremendous amount of important work was being done by the workers at the Experimental Farm. The hostess, assisted by Mrs. C. C. Jones and Mrs. John Webster, then refreshed the departing guests with coffee and light refreshments.

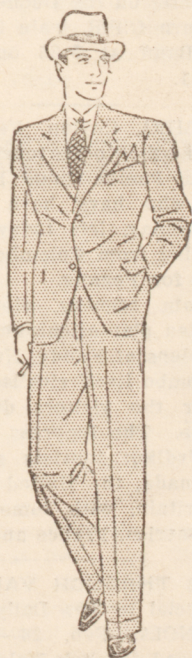
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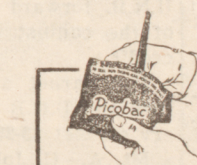
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
