stated date. (I haven't the exact re-
port by me.) But, as the number at
the earlier date is not given, no very
intelligent figure can be arrived at.
R.A.F. Unequaled

Machine for machine, it is unlikely
that any air force on the continent
can equal the Royal Air Force, at
the present time, and in fact until
at least the end of 1937. Great Brit-
ain came late into the race. In May,
1935, she had not more than 1,015
first-line machines. That was a con-
siderable increase over the previous
year. Today the number is approxi-
mately double the total of two years
ago, and more than double in effect-
iveness. The problem of obsolescence
has not yet become an important one.

Britain has, however, the problem
of a dispersed air force. The only
other major European country fitted
with a similar problem is the U.S.S.R.
Ten months ago the Slavs had at
least 550, and probably closer to
1,000 machines based on Vladivostok.
Germany probably has a larger
stock of obsolescent machines than
any other European country. Even
the sturdy Ju 52's are considered
slow by 1937 standards, and are grad-
ually being superseded by Ju 80's.
(Ju is an abbreviation for Junker).

Italy has a few squadrons in Lybia,
Eritrea and Ethiopia. Her naval ma-
chines are said to be superb. There
is criticism, outside Italy, of the qual-
ity of her flying personnel.

France is devoting 1937 to a virtual
revamping of her whole air force.
That accounts for the fact that her
total may be as low as 1,000. Current
History's figures for France at the
end of 1936 were: First line, 1,500;
second line, 1,600.

Armament statistics are well-nigh
valueless. Air force figures espe-
cially require evaluation. Permit me
to conclude with an example, ad ab-
surdum but true. In 1929 I visited
Chang Hsueh-liang in his Mukden
fortress-home. Braggings of his air
force he said: "I have 40 machines—
but unfortunately only three can safe-
ly leave the ground!"
