BOARD OF TRADE MEETS

RIVER LEVEL SINKING

The water in the Saint John River is within a foot of the summer low, it was learned this morning from Chief Engineer John J. Malloy of the Fredericton Pumping Station. This is the lowest the water has been at this time of the years for seven years. Up to this week the water level has kept pretty well up because of the heavy rains prevailing throughout the province, but the recent dry, hot weather is causing the river level to sink continually. Present conditions can be attributed, in part at least, to the abnormally low freshet this spring. Mr. Malloy stated.

AUTO THIEVES CONVICTED

MCKINNEY, WORTMAN, MOORE, QUIGG GET YEAR EACH IN CAR THEFT CASE

Ronald Vaughn Discharged, No Evidence--Liquor Case Dismissed

Four convictions with sentences totalling four years were handed down this morning by Magistrate Limerick, when Wm. McKinney, Robert Wortman and Edgar Moore, and James Quigg and Ronald Vaughn appeared before the court for judgment. In the latter case, of the Crown vs. Vaughn, the prisoner was dismissed due to lack of evidence, while in each of the others, sentences of one year were handed down.

One more case on the docket, that of Thomas O'Leary charged with an offence of the liquor act, was dismissed, petition to this effect having been made by the prosecution.

McKinney, Wortman and Moore were arrested some time ago, and charged with the theft of a car belonging to Wallace Neil of Devon. The car was taken from its parking place in Phoenix Square on July 6, and later found abandoned in the Grand Bay area. The three prisoners were arrested in the vicinity, and brought to the city and charged with

the theft of the car. They were tried last Tuesday and remanded until noon today, being at that time found guilty and sentenced.

Quigg and Vaughn were arrested on a similar charge, the stolen car belonging to Bernard Danby of Nashwaaksis. The car was taken at about the same time as was the Neil car, and also taken from the Phoenix Square, where the owner had parked it before going to work. In the trial of the two men yesterday, the witnesses swore that they had seen a car of the description of the Danby car pass them, going in the general direction of Saint John, and that the driver closely resembled Quigg. They could not say, however, whether the driver was alone or not.

Magistrate Limerick found Quigg guilty as charged, and sentenced him also, to one year in jail. Vaughn was discharged, the Magistrate ruling that no evidence had been produced against him.

Thomas O'Leary, the third case on the docket, was discharged, charges having been withdrawn.

1937 EXHIBITION BIGGER THAN EVER, SAY DIRECTORS

Much Construction and Renovation in Buildings and Grounds--Better Lighting System.

EMPHASIZE HORSES

All Departments To Be Expanded--More Prizes This Year.

The Fredericton Exhibition, scheduled the week of September 11-18 inclusive, will be bigger and better than last year, it was decided at the regular monthly meeting of the board of directors of the Fredericton Exhibition Company, Ltd., held last night. In an endeavor to achieve this aim, the directors have decided to put the entire \$3,000-odd surplus remaining from last year's exhibition back into this year's show.

Considerable construction and renovation work has and is still being carried out. The old horse stalls along the Wilnot Park side of the grounds have been torn down, and a new fence has been built--bigger and better also, lament Fredericton's youngsters. Two new lines of cattle stalls have been built. Four new actors' dressing rooms are under construction, and also new sleeping quarters for livestock. The groups and buildings are being re-wired by the Maritime Electric Company, Ltd., and some necessary improvements in the main industrial building are underway.

This year special emphasis is being put on the exhibition of heavy blooded horses. In accordance with the provincial government work along that line. More money will be spent in every department, it was announced.

DEVON FIREMEN URGE FORMATION FIREMENS ASSOC.

Fire Depts. in N. B. and Eastern Maine Invited To Join.

CONFERENCE AUG. 12

Dissatisfaction of Certain Units With Maritime Assoc. Rumored Cause.

Preparations for the formation of an Eastern Maine and New Brunswick Firemen's Association are going on apace as a result of a meeting last night of committees of the Fredericton and Devon fire department. A letter was drafted to be sent out to all departments in New Brunswick and eastern Maine from Quoddy to Port Fairfield by the Devon department inviting them to join. The letters will be sent out within the next few days, it was learned.

The first step in the formation of the proposed association will be the calling of a conference of delegates of all departments to meet in Devon on August 12. Last night preliminary plans were made for the conference, which will be featured by a firemen's carnival of sports, sponsored by the Devon brigade.

Formation of such an association has been agitated for some time, since many of the departments have broken away in dissatisfaction from the Maritime Association, it was said. Already many clubs have signified their intention of joining the proposed new association. It is said to have strong support from the Maine departments as well as from many in New Brunswick, who have founded a strong bond of international good feeling.

Under the new association, one benefit will be the fact that several tournaments can be held each year at the will of any department which wishes to sponsor a meet. All are closely connected with each other

QUEBEC TOURIST BUSINESS PROSPERS AT N. B.'S EXPENSE

Charge Made By Innkeepers of North Shore--The Wrong Emphasis in Tourist Literature, Claim--Ald. F. S. Mundle Reports on Conditions

"The hotels on the Gaspe Coast are doing a very large tourist business, while the hotels at Campbellton and Bathurst and other points on the North Shore are complaining that their tourist trade is much smaller than last year." This was the statement made today to The Daily Mail by Ald. F. S. Mundle, who has returned from a trip to the North Shore and Matapedia. In discussing tourist matters, Mr. Mundle states that the hotel proprietors and others attribute the small amount of tourist travel so far this year to the fact that N. B. tourist literature was late in being circulated among the booking offices of the United States. This statement bears out the remarks on the same subject made in The Daily Mail two days ago.

The hotel men, according to Mr. Mundle, also claim that the literature sent out from the Bureau of Information here deals too much with New Brunswick as a salmon fishing and a bear hunting centre, and does not lay enough stress upon New Brunswick's scenic beauty. They contend that hundreds of tourists visit Quebec and the Maritime Provinces for the purpose of viewing the scenery, and that these are not interested in either bears or salmon.

Last year a number of tourists coming from New England States entered the province at the St. Leonard's bridge, and, after crossing the province over the Stewart Highway to Campbellton, returned to the United States by way of the Province of Quebec. Thus the only portion of New Brunswick visited was the little strip through the woods between St. Leonard's and Campbellton.

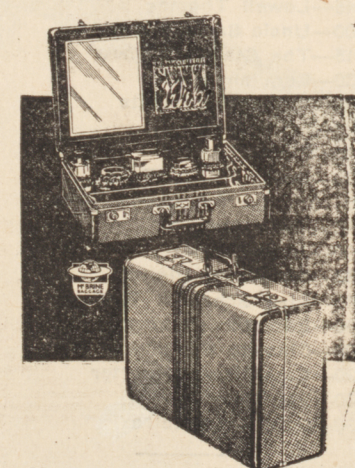
