AUTO-RAILER WILL GO ON REGULAR SERVICE MONDAY

MONCTON, Aug. 27-The first auto-railer ever to be used in the Maritimes will be placed into regular service on Monday, August 30th next by the Canadian National Railways between Moncton and Saint John. The service will be operated daily except Sunday.

The first train will be commenced from Moncton on Monday morning at 7.00 a.m. the car leaving from the Canadian National Railways station. The arrival at Saint John will be at 9.35 a.m., returning from Saint John the auto-railer will leave at 8.00 p.m., arriving back in Moncton at 10.35 p. m. All times given are Atlantic Standard. Stops will be made in both directions at Salisbury, River Glade, Petitcodiac, Sussex and Norton.

This service is in the nature of an experiment and its continuance will depend upon the extent to which it is patronized. Owing to limited accommodation passengers are advised to make reservations in advance. Second class, bargain coach tickets and passes will not be accepted, and hand baggage only will be carried.
