
PREMIER EXPECTED

Leave To Inspect Film Material Of N. B. Travelogue

D. W. Griffiths, director of the New Brunswick Government Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel, and C. C. Avar, editor of the Sackville Tribune, will leave for New York City tonight to inspect the film material gathered in this province during the past summer by personal representatives of Lowell Thomas for incorporation into a New Brunswick travelogue.

The shots taken in all parts of the province during the past summer by Mr. and Mrs. Rexford Barton have been developed and are now ready for editing and assembly before being presented to the theatre-going public of the world. The completed film will be released through Universal Films, Inc.

A book entitled "Seeing New Brunswick with Lowell Thomas," written jointly by the famous commentator and Mr. Barton, is nearly ready for submission to the bureau for its approval. Supplementing the travelogue it will also be in addition to a series of articles about New Brunswick to be published in a popular magazine.

ST. JOHN RIVER VALLEY ROADS IN GOOD SHAPE

Unless Snow Comes, Will Be Open Until Christmas

Curve Cut Out

Even Unpaved Stretch Is Good, Say The Motorists

"The highways up the Saint John River Valley are in perfect condition and unless something totally unexpected occurs, should be open to traffic until Christmas," was the opinion voiced by two motorists who stopped in the city at noon today while making the last lap of an Edmundston to Saint John round trip.

Despite the fact that between Pokok and Woodstock there is a stretch of 20 miles of unpaved highway, it was stated that a better road could not be expected, and that they are much ahead of the conditions usually found at this season.

Only one troublesome spot existed in the road yesterday, that being a few miles below Woodstock. On this particular stretch of highway the road is very rough but not dangerous. In removing the dangerous cubic spiral which existed just this side of the Town of Woodstock, the road has been routed parallel to the railway tracks in such a way that the curve is now in the vicinity of five degrees instead of a dangerous 22 degrees.

The new diversion was a major operation, necessitating the cutting of a high bank which overhung the curve. One house was removed out of the new right-of-way and set up on a new foundation. The storage tanks of the Imperial Oil Co. Ltd., also had to be dismantled and removed and were set up on a new location near the C. P. R. Station. The new road is safely passable, it was said.

C. C. WOOD, LOCAL MERCHANT, DIED HERE YESTERDAY

Conducted Business On University Avenue For Many Years

The death of Corey Chipman Wood, well known Fredericton merchant, which occurred at his home, 337 Aberdeen Street yesterday afternoon will be learned by his many friends with sincere regret. The late Mr. Wood, who for the past ten years has conducted a store on University Avenue, was well known in the city, and was noted for his honesty and fairness in all his business transactions.

Of an upright Christian nature, he was a steady member of the congregation of the George Street Baptist Church. Born in Albert County 63 years ago he followed the sea in his younger days and later clerked with the George Prescott Co. at Harvey, Albert County. About ten years ago he came to this city and has been in the grocery business ever since.

The deceased has been in ill health for some time but it has only been in the past few weeks that he has been absent from his business.

Beside his wife he is survived by two brothers, Clarence Wood, Albert County, and Charles Wood of this city. E. H. Wilbur of this city is a brother-in-law.

The funeral service will take place tomorrow afternoon at the home, Aberdeen Street at four o'clock. Rev. John Linton will conduct the service. The remains will be taken to Harvey, Albert County, Monday morning for interment.

Horatio N. Clayton Passes at Marysville

The death occurred at an early hour this morning of one of the older residents of Marysville when Horatio N. Clayton passed away at his home at the advanced age of 82 years.

The late Mr. Clayton possessed many friends and was well known and highly respected. Born in Marysville, he spent his entire life there. A lumberman all his life, he worked for many years under "Boss" Alexander Gibson and was a trusted and valued employee of the famous lumber king.

He is survived by his wife and one daughter, Mrs. Edward Jardine. Also surviving is one brother, Claude D. Clayton, Marysville, and one sister, Mrs. Stella Cochrane, also of Marysville.

The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon from the home of his sister, Mrs. Stella Cochrane, Marysville. Rev. M. D. Oliver will conduct the services at 2 o'clock. Interment will be made at the Methodist Cemetery, Marysville.

LULL NOTICEABLE IN CITY GOVERNMENT CIRCLES AS ANNUAL ELECTION NEARS WITH SIX SEATS TO BE REFILLED

Report of Financial Committee Concerning the Grant For Hospital Addition To Be Presented At Tuesday's Meeting

With the civil elections only a little over a month away, when the citizens of Fredericton will go to the polls to elect five aldermen and a mayor for the next two years, a lull is noticeable in city government circles. With so little time in office left, the present Council is noticeably hesitant in approaching questions of any great moment. As one member said, this is because it is felt that important decisions should be left to the incoming Council, which body will have had the approval of the electorate in its decisions.

This, stated Deputy Mayor Ray T. Forbes, is the reason that the matter of the expenditure of \$100,000 and the guaranteeing of a bond issue of \$250,000 for the purpose of erecting a new wing to the Victoria Public Hospital will be shelved until such time as the new Council may be able to take action. This is also partially the reason why the adoption of the new town planning by-law has been postponed until Jan. 17.

To Seek Re-election

It is understood that the four aldermen whose term expires—Dr. B. R. Ross, W. Raymond Crowdon, Murray Hazerman and Ivan McKnight—will seek re-election. When questioned today as to whether he would run again for the office of mayor, His Worship G. Willard Kitchen stated that he has not as yet considered the matter. It is understood from informed sources, however, that nomination week, the first week in January, will see the name G. Willard Kitchen entered for that office.

One new face will certainly be seen on the Council this year—the choice of Queen's Ward to fill the vacancy caused by the automatic resignation of T. Earl Doohan. Mr. Doohan ceased to be a member of the Council upon his removal of residence from the city. Little more than routine business is expected at the regular committee meeting.

Will Present Report

At the regular Council meeting Tuesday evening the report of the Finance Committee concerning the proposed grant to the Hospital Board of Trustees will be presented, stated Deputy Mayor Forbes. A meeting of the committee has been called for Tuesday night, a half hour before the beginning of the Council meeting, to draw up the report to be presented.

According to an official notice appearing in The Daily Mail today taxes will have to be paid by December 13 in order to entitle any ratepayer to vote in the civic election in January next.

SHORT COURSE IN AGRICULTURE TO OPEN ON JAN. 4

To Come Under Dominion Youth Training Plan

Many Enroll

Second Course In March If Necessary, Says Mr. Taylor

A short course in agriculture, to be conducted early in the coming year, was announced today by Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture.

The opening date is set for January 4, 1938, and as usual the course will be held at the New Brunswick Agricultural School. The course is being sponsored jointly by the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture and the Federal Department of Labour under the latter's newly instituted youth training project. Instead of by the provincial Department alone, as has been the custom in previous years. In other years the course was usually opened early in November, lasting for six weeks.

The Provincial Department will facilitate attendance by paying railway fares of students from and to their homes, and by defraying boarding charges in excess of \$3.00 per week. Further assistance will also be available to students who qualify under regulations of the youth training project.

Keen interest in the course is shown by the number of letters already reaching the Department. Should the number of applicants exceed dormitory and class room accommodation, a second course will be held between February 15th and March 25th the Minister stated.

TWO SMALL FIRES

An overheated pipe at the home of Mrs. Melbourne Flowering, Woodstock Road at about ten o'clock last night caused slight damage. The fire department was called and quickly extinguished the flames. Another call was put in at about 9.30 this morning from the home of Mrs. Mary Colby, Charlotte Street, where a chimney fire was in progress. Little damage was done. There were four false blows of the fire department siren this morning, caused by employees of the Maritime Electric Co. Ltd., who while working on their own wires, accidentally broke those governing the action of the siren.

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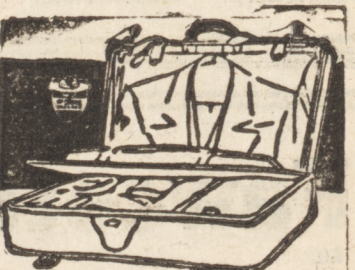
