# UNION MAJOR PARTIES IN CANADA MIGHT AID RECOVERY AND SAVE SOLVENCY OF THE NATION

## Results of F.H.S. Entrance Exams Are Announced Today

One Hundred and Twenty - Five On Pass List Handed in Today

Number Recommended by Teachers 118

Trustees Will Decide Action in Regard to Those in Third Division

Results of the High School Entrance examinations were given out today by the Fredericton School Board. The results are that six from the eighth grades of the schools passed in first division, fifty in second division and sixty-nine in third division. There were twenty-six failures. In regard to those whose names appeared in third division the matter will be taken up by the school board and it will then be decided how many of these may be admitted to the High School. One hundred and twenty-five are on the pass list.

In addition to those mentioned above as having passed the High School Entrance Examinations one hundred and eighteen were recommended to go into the High School without examination. Of this number which were recommended a couple of weeks ago thirteen were from one room of the Smythe Street School and sixteen from another room. York Street School recommended sixteen, Charlotte Street twenty, the Model School ten, and Regent Street recommended six. Twenty three recommended from the Devon School, seven from Marysville and seven from Nashwaakasis.

CASLE GANDOLFO, Italy, July 12—Pope Pius, his voice carried throughout the world by radio, prayed today for "a little tranquility" on earth and for recognition of God's "Divine sovereignty, obedience to His holy laws" and for the practice of justice and charity.

His Holiness spoke on the occasion of the inauguration of a new cathedral at Lisieux, France, dedicated to St. Theresa.

The Pope, sitting in the private library of his summer residence here, could not prevent his voice from trembling with emotion when he spoke of St. Theresa, his favorite saint. His voice filled with feeling, moreover, when he made an indirect reference to the belief his own life is drawing toward its close.

He asked his hearers to pray "that they may, without fear and even with confidence, draw close, as they do with each passing day, to the tribunal of God to render an account of

## ADMIRAL BYRD PLANS ANOTHER EXPEDITION

Will Go To South Pole in 1938 or 1939—Promote Peace

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., July 12—Admiral Richard E. Byrd announced recently he is planning another expedition to the South Pole in 1938 or 1939 and that he intends to spend the "rest of my life promoting world peace" after that trip.

He said he probably would take tractors on his next expedition, which will be his fourth into polar regions. Previously, he has used only dogs and man-power.

Byrd also said he believed Amelia Earhart will be found, "whether on land or floating if signals supposed to have been sent from her plane actually came from her."

The explorer came here from Tremont, Me., to speak at an International Christian Endeavor convention about "World Peace."

## Our Tourist Literature

COMPLAINTS are being made this season by different hotel men throughout the province and by others interested in the tourist traffic that tourist booklets, maps and other tourist information which should have been in the hands of the different booking centres in the United States not later than the last of April were this year at least six weeks late in being distributed. The result is that people throughout the United States and other centres who contemplate taking trips had before them at an early date all information relating to Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island while they were unable to obtain until well along in June this year the necessary information in regard to this province. This is not as it should be and is liable to have a considerable effect upon our tourist travel. The same applies to local literature in connection with the Fredericton Tourist Branch of the Board of Trade. This organization got out for distribution a pamphlet which was very poorly arranged, but which might have done some good if it had been issued several weeks earlier. These are matters which should be avoided another year if we wish to get the full benefit that comes through the distribution of literature in regard to tourist travel. In regard to our local tourist literature it would be well when issuing this to have it done under the direction of a committee, members of which are familiar with this kind of work and to have the matter prepared by experts who are able to turn out a creditable production. There is a tendency to put on such committees men who do not know their work.

Both the Provincial Government and the local Board of Trade are spending money and doing their best, and rightly so, to encourage tourist travel to these parts. We have in New Brunswick a regular paradise for the tourists. We do our best to welcome the stranger within our gates and to make him feel at home. The Government is doing its part in providing good roads free from dust and danger, but all this work can easily be minimized by a faulty system in getting out literature. This applies to both the Provincial and the local organizations. It is very well to have the scenery. It is all right to have a kingly river, a queenly city and a thousand rural charms but if we do not let outsiders know about these, and let them know at a time when they are making their arrangements for their summer outings we cannot expect to reap the full benefit which might otherwise accrue in regard to our tourist travel. Care should be taken another year to see that whatever information, including maps and literature which we have to send out, would go forward in time so as to reach prospective tourists and give them a chance to read up on our tourist resources and to complete their arrangements to visit our province. Many of those who have visited New Brunswick in the past have been so impressed with this wonderful tourist country that they will come again and induce their friends to come. But more than this we wish to place in the hands of those who have not previously been here information in regard to our wonderful province and its advantages as a summer resort. This can only be done by having this information in the hands of the booking offices in the United States at a seasonable time.

## JAPAN MILITARY PARTY TO RESIST OPPOSITION CHINA

All Precautions Taken To Guard Lives of Citizens

TOKIO, Japan, July 12—Japan is determined on a showdown in North China. The military party are determined to break the spirit of resistance to Japan and things Japanese becoming evident in China. It was stated that orders given to Japanese troops could not be cancelled. Serious trouble was feared should Chinese troops advance towards Japanese positions. Japan was said to be taking all possible precautions to guard her civilians in China in fear of anti-Japanese outbreaks.

Guns roared again last night along the Yungting River as both Japan and China were reported speeding fresh troops to the North China zone of conflict.

The cannonading, in the fighting area 10 miles west of this city, was distinctly audible in Peiping. Both Japanese and Chinese admitted fighting had been resumed after negotiations had been broken down.

Peiping itself, in the grip of rigid martial law, was ominously silent. All gates were closed, but from the walls could be heard the rumbling and clanking of Japanese tanks on the nearby roads, apparently moving toward Fengtai, five miles southwest of the city.

It was the fifth night of bloodshed along the Yungting, where fighting began late Wednesday near Marco Polo bridge.

Tientsin despatches stated 35 trucks carrying 700 troops of Japan's Manchurian army had passed near Tientsin. The soldiers boarded

OTTAWA, July 12—A report is spreading in Ottawa that certain powerful interests are considering the ways and means to pave the way towards the establishment of a National Government in Canada, and they are now engaged in formulating certain plans to accomplish this object.

The basis of this report does not indicate that either Prime Minister King or the leader of the Official Opposition, Hon. R. B. Bennett, are ready to retire from public life, but it is claimed that such vital negotiations are going on right now with the main purpose of satisfying certain discontented elements in both major political parties, and also to make a supreme effort to unite all political forces of the Dominion towards effecting basic and sound economy in public expenditure and to lower or avoid higher taxation in the country. Such a union of major parties may be instrumental in aiding the business recovery of the Dominion and in saving the solvency of this nation through a quicker and more direct solution of several momentous national problems. At least, that is the claims of the persons sponsoring this scheme.

Everywhere one hears gossip on this report, and the discussions in recent weeks in influential circles in Ottawa leads to the conclusion that it is not a mere rumour now, but a report that has definite foundation of facts. Consequently, expert observation of the national scene, discloses that the progress towards realization of the idea has advanced far more than anyone outside the Capital can fully appreciate or understand.

Union of major political parties is nothing new to Canada. It has happened on a number of occasions.

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## POSTPONE SEARCH AMELIA EARHART UNTIL TUESDAY

HONOLULU, July 12—The search by 62 naval planes for Miss Earhart and her navigator has been postponed until Tuesday. This has been done to allow all the ships engaged in the search to assume designated positions and thus safeguard the lives of the flyers engaged in the search in the event of one of them being forced down.

The Colorado and her three planes, from 40 miles north of Howland Island reported absolutely no result from her search of the Phoenix Island group.

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
