## BLOWOUT DITCHES S.M.T. BUS AT UPP. GAGETOWN

### Two Slightly Injured—No Damage Done To Vehicle

Two passengers were slightly injured and the remainder shaken up when the seven o'clock S. M. T. bus bound for Saint John ran into the roadside ditch this morning at Upper Gagetown.

The accident happened about 8:30 when the right front tire of the vehicle blew out. Driver Pat Morton, Marysville, endeavored to keep the bus on the road, but was unsuccessful. The Saint John to Fredericton bus came upon the scene of the accident a half hour later and the passengers were transferred to it and taken to Saint John. Aboard the disabled bus was the French Lake Band, along with eight members of the band of the Fredericton Lodge of the Knights of Pythias.

Except for the blown out tire, the bus was uninjured. A wrecking car was sent to Upper Gagetown from this city to bring it into Fredericton.

## TWO MEN CHARGED WITH AUTO THEFT REMANDED THIS MORNING

### RONALD VAUGHN AND JAMES QUIGG, ST. JOHN, TO APPEAR TOMORROW MORNING

### Drunken Driver is Committed to Trial

Ronald Vaughn and James Quigg, both of Saint John appeared in the police court this morning charged with the theft of an automobile from Bernard Bandy of Nashwaaksis on Tuesday morning. They were remanded until tomorrow morning, at eleven o'clock.

Another case on the docket, that of Kenneth Griffith, charged with driving under the influence of liquor, Chief of Police Jones and Officer Brown of the city police were called to the stand by C. R. Barry who prosecuted the case. Griffith was committed to trial at the September sitting of the Circuit Court.

Arrest of Vaughn and Quigg followed the finding of the car, abandoned on the road in the Geary woods, by Constable Matchett of the Fredericton detachment, R.C.M.P. The owner was not aware that his vehicle had been stolen until it was found by the officer.

Quigg was arrested in Saint John Friday afternoon, while Vaughn, the second member of the trio alleged to have stolen the car was arrested Saturday evening. It is understood that the trio, Edgar Moore, William McKinney and Robert Wortman, who were arrested and charged with the theft of a car belonging to Wallace Neil and Vaughn and Quigg together with another party came out of the pulpwoods together, and were in a group in Fredericton before the

thefts. A third party, whose name has not yet been divulged will be brought to Fredericton as a material witness. It is expected that the five will come up before Magistrate Limerick tomorrow morning.

In evidence given by Chief of Police Jones and Officer Brown, in connection with the Griffith case, it was stated that they received a complaint concerning a car on upper Queen Street, and driving up to this section of town saw the car of the accused parked there. It then drove through an alley connecting Queen and Campbell streets, and when the car bearing the police had gone up Queen street and out Northumberland onto Campbell, they came upon the car again; this time parked in the middle of the street a little below the mouth of the connecting alley.

They drove up beside it and asked what they (Griffith and his party) were doing there. Griffith told the police that the were just parked there. Griffith was ordered out of the car, and was found to be unsteady on his feet. He was told by Chief of Police Jones that he was in no condition to drive a car, and answered that he had only had two bottles of beer. It was brought out that Griffith was behind the wheel, and that in getting out of the car upset a bottle of intoxicating liquor which was sitting by his feet. The bottle was introduced in evidence.

C. R. Barry conducted the prosecution, Leon Cain defended the accused.

## EEL FISHERY TO BE ESTABLISHED ON SAINT JOHN RIVER AT MEDUCTIC

### Maine Man Plans to Ship 50 Barrels of Eels Packed in Ice to Eastern U. S. Markets.

William Koenig, Lincoln, Maine, is convinced that eels can be taken from the St. John River, packed in ice, and shipped to the United States market at a profit. That he is experienced in this line of commercial effort is shown by the fact that he has been carrying on in the Province of Quebec for some years and last season shipped from that province to points in the Eastern States many barrels of eels. He has chosen the village of Meductic as the scene of his operations on the St. John River, and has succeeded in interesting a number of river men of that section in his enterprise. He hopes within a short time to make shipments totalling fifty barrels from that locality.

Eels, although but little used here as an article of food, are regarded as a delicacy in the large cities of the United States. A piratical sort of fish, eels frequent the St. John river in large numbers and are very destructive to young salmon and also prey on the adult fish to some extent.

It is claimed that an eel pot, patterned somewhat like a balloon fly trap and properly baited, will gather in anywhere from 20 to 100 eels in the course of a night.

Fishery Supervisor, L. H. Parks, reports a great abundance of suckers in the Madawaska river, and is of the opinion that the fish might be taken in sufficient quantities to justify their use for commercial purposes. Supervisor Parks is having his officers keep a close check on the activity at Meductic and believes that the solution of one of the

difficulties confronting the department in the matter of salmon propagation is nearing a solution in a very practical way.
