N. B. POULTRY TO GET ANNUAL TEST BLOOD DISEASE

N. B. Well Advanced In Pullorum Control

Mortality Not High

Tenth Yearly Campaign To Begin This Month

Poultry blood testing for the control of pullorum or bacillary white diarrhoea will be resumed under direction of poultry division officials during the present month, it was announced today by Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture. This will be the tenth annual campaign.

New Brunswick has been well to the front among Canadian provinces in taking steps to control this disease of poultry, Mr. Taylor stated. Last year 43,137 birds were tested with only 1.83 per cent of reactors and of the 252 flocks tested, 156 were without a single reactor. "It is clear from these figures," said the Minister, "that the testing conducted at present is largely of a precautionary measure and not because of high chick mortality from this cause in recent years."

The final session was held this morning. This afternoon, Dr. MacFarlane interviewed the inspectors individually. They will return to their homes this evening.

DEMOLISHING BUILDING

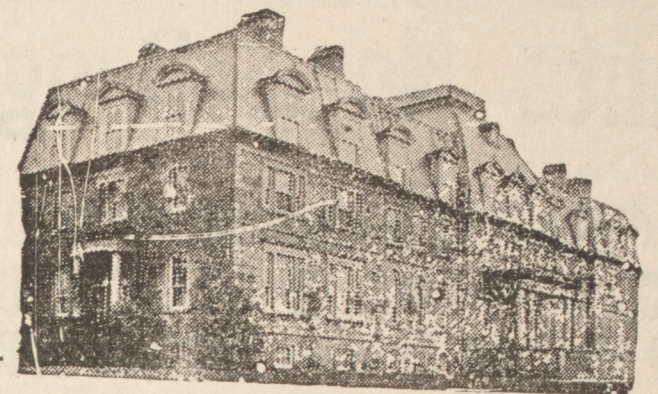

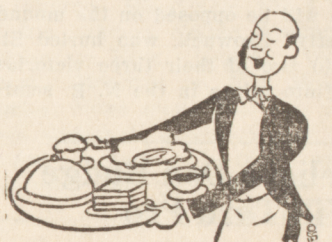

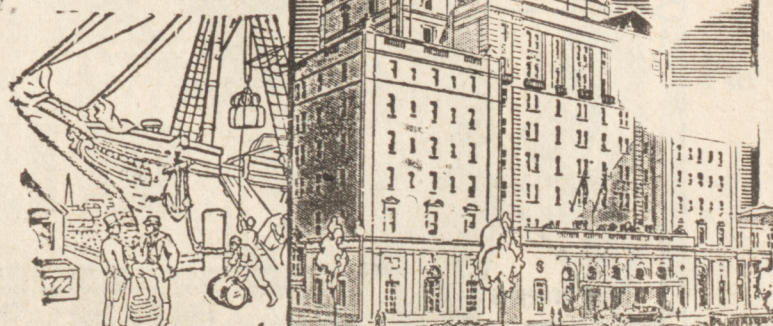
