MAY SOLEMNIZE MARRIAGE
Rev. R. E. Whitney, a United Baptist clergyman of Bridgewater, N. S., has been registered to solemnize marriage in this province temporarily from Sept. 22 to Oct. 31, it was announced in today's issue of the Royal Gazette.

GOODS NOT RECOVERED
The club bag containing papers, and the overcoat which were in the car stolen a few days ago from Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture for New Brunswick, have not yet been recovered. A Moncton man was suspected of having had the club bag, but this turned out to be unfounded.

TO ATTEND EXHIBITION
Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture for New Brunswick, who is in Fredericton today on departmental business, will attend the opening of the Chatham Exhibition on Monday, Sept. 27, and will go from there to Edmundston to attend the opening of the first exhibition ever to be held in that town, which opens on Tuesday.

LEFT FOR CAMPBELLTON
Hon. Dr. A. P. Paterson, Minister of Education, Federal and Municipal Relations, and James H. Conlon, Director of Federal and Municipal Relations, left this city this morning for Campbellton to attend the annual convention of the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities, which opened in that city this morning.

THREE NEW STUDENTS
The total enrollment of new students at the University of New Brunswick has increased from 95 yesterday to 98 this morning, it was stated this morning by Miss Edith MacLeod, secretary to the president. The three additional students are: Frederick Beatty and Thomas F. Kennedy, both of Woodstock, and Morgan Ruddock, Bathurst. All three are entering the university as freshman engineers.

TWO NEW CREDIT UNIONS
Two new credit unions have been incorporated in New Brunswick. It was revealed in today's issue of the Royal Gazette. One, in Madawaska County, will go under the name of La Caisse Populaire de St. Francois de Medawaska Limitee, while the other, in Westmorland County, is named the Little Shemogue Credit Union Society Limited.

Milk Dealers Must Report to Commission

A new regulation of the New Brunswick Dairy Products Commission, appearing in today's issue of the Royal Gazette, provides that all milk dealers licensed by the commission shall make a monthly report to the head office of the body, in this city, showing: the names and addresses of all producers from whom they buy their products; the amount purchased from each producer; and the percentage of butterfat in the produce of each producer.

The reports, which are required to be made within ten days after the beginning of each month, after Nov. 1, must be made on forms provided by the commission. The report shall be divided into two statements, one giving the above outlined information from the first of the month to the 15th, and the other from the 16th of the month to the end. The reports must also show the last date of payment to the producers, and amount owed to each producer at the time the report is made.

SKELETON REPORTED AT MACINQUAC

SUIT MRS. S. PERRY TO BE HEARD AT COURT SESSION

Eight Cases at Session
Circuit Court on
Sept. 28th

Five Criminal
Rex vs. Wilfred Phillips,
Charged With Bigamy
On Two Counts

Another chapter of the tragic death of Prof. Stanley Calvin Perry, late of this city, a former associate professor of mineralogy and geology at the University of New Brunswick, which occurred on Nov. 17 last, when his car collided with a city fire truck, will be written at the sitting of the circuit court here on Sept. 28. Hon. Mr. Justice C. D. Richards will preside.

Mrs. Perry, wife of the deceased and administratrix of the estate of her husband, is suing the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton for damages, the amount of which is said to be in the vicinity of \$35,000.

The accident occurred at the intersection of Brunswick and Westmorland Streets, and resulted in the death of Prof. Perry in the local hospital early the following morning. The firm of Hanson, Dougherty and West is representing the plaintiff, who now resides in Bathurst, while P. J. Hughes, K.C., solicitor for the city, is representing the defendants.

Two Other Civil Cases
There are two other civil cases on the docket, and five criminal cases, according to A. R. Muray, clerk of the York County Circuit, and crown prosecutor. The first civil case is that of David and William Foreman vs. Spurgeon Jewett, Lee Buckley, Leon Urquhart and Harry Wilson. The defendants are being sued for trespass on property of the plaintiffs. All are residents of York County, the land in question being in Bird Settlement. Messrs. Limerick and Limerick are representing the plaintiff, while E. C. Atkinson is counsel for the defendant.

A case of slander on the reputation and character of the plaintiff, makes the third case on the civil docket. Allan Ward, of this city, has brought suit against Gladys Sansom. A. R. Murray is representing the plaintiff, while the firm of Hanson, Dougherty and West has been engaged by the defendant.

Three Criminal Cases
Three of the criminal cases are those of Kenneth Griffiths, Keswick and William Coughlin, and Llewellyn Ward of this city. All three informations were laid by chief of police Nathaniel Jones, and the accused committed to trial by Magistrate Walter Limerick. All three are charged with having care and control of a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor.

Leo Cain is defending Griffiths, Arthur Mc F. Limerick is defending Coughlin, while Ralph V. Limerick is counsel for Ward. It is understood that one of the cases may be tried before Hon. Judge A. R. Slipp under the Speedy Trials Act.

Bigamy Case
To complete the docket are the criminal cases the King vs. Wilfred Phillips, on information of Myrtle Phillips and the King vs. Wilfred Phillips on information of Const. L. B. Matchett, R.C.M.P. charging him with bigamy, and the King vs. William McFadden of Taymouth, of information of Agnes Painter, charging him with a serious offense.

A. R. Murray is prosecuting all criminal cases, while W. J. West is defending Phillips. McFadden has no counsel as yet.

Company Formed To Carry On Wood Manufacturing Business

The York Flooring Mills, Ltd., has been incorporated under the N. B. Companies' Act, it was announced in today's issue of the Royal Gazette. The new concern, which will establish a plant at Devon, has a capital stock of \$15,000, divided into 150 shares of \$100 each. The members of the company are C. L. Dougherty, W. J. West, and Horace A. Hanson, all barristers-at-law of this city.

The new company is empowered, among other things, to manufacture and deal in all kinds of wood products, wholesale and retail, both for foreign and domestic trade, to carry on a business in all products that can be used, either directly or indirectly, in the building and roofing trades, to carry on in all its branches a lumbering industry, as regards both the raw material and the finished product.

Youth Crushed Under Wheels Loaded Truck

Gerald Burke, 18, Instantly Killed at The Barony Yesterday

Crushed beneath the dual wheels of a heavily loaded gravel truck on Highway No. 2, about 33 miles above this city yesterday afternoon, Gerald Burke, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Burke of Dumfries, and an employee of the Currier Construction Co., was instantly killed, making the third fatality on road paving projects in different parts of the province this summer. The tragedy was the result of an unsuccessful attempt to board the truck, driven by Stanley Fraser, also of Dumfries.

Investigated by Const. L. B. Matchett, Fredericton Detachment, R. C. M. P. and Coroner Dr. Charles MacKay, it was disclosed that Burke, who was employed on the shoulder crew, started up to the tool box to get a new shovel. The point where the men were working was in the middle of a hill.

It is said that Burke had called to the driver of the truck but the driver did not hear him and as he jumped on the side of the cab and attempted to grasp the door handle, his foot slipped on the running-board and he fell beneath the wheels. The truck was travelling at a speed of about 10 miles per hour.

No Inquest
After investigation by Constable Matchett and Coroner MacKay, it was decided by the latter that no inquest would be necessary.

Several men, employed with the unfortunate man, were eye witnesses to the tragedy. James Davis, formerly of this city, and well known in inter-scholastic basketball circles was one, while Israel Donnelly and Ralph Baisley were other witnesses.

Dr. MacKay stated that the wheel had apparently passed almost lengthwise over the young man's body, crushing him so badly that his face was hardly recognizable. It was stated by police that the loaded truck would weigh several tons, the box containing about 3½ yards of gravel at the time. Other than injuries to the head, he suffered a broken right leg, a dislocated hip, and internal injuries.

Permission was given for the removal of the body to the home of his parents, and it is probable that the funeral will take place on Thursday.

STEEL SPANS ARRIVE FOR NEW BRIDGE

Work on Sub-Structure Held Up By Lack of Cement

Work on the new Canadian National Railways bridge, which has been held up to a great extent because of lack of cement and lack of steel work, is being continued, it is claimed, as speedily as possible. A shipment of steel spans arrived in this city yesterday from the Hamilton Bridge Company, Hamilton, Ont., and it is understood that this work will be rushed as quickly as possible. There cannot be much done on the superstructure until the piers are completed.

The Richardson Construction Company, Ltd., which has the contract for the substructure of the new bridge was supposed to have its end of the work completed by Oct. 1, but due to unfortunate circumstances, this has proven impossible. Extreme difficulty has been experienced in obtaining enough cement because of the boom in the cement manufacturing business of late.

Cement manufacturers have had more orders than they could fill, due to the revival in the building trade.

Mystery Surrounds Discovery

Believed To Be That of Louis Burden, Lost Six Years Ago

A skeleton, believed to be that of Louis Burden, who disappeared from the farm of A. L. Slipp at Queensbury six years ago, was discovered on Sunday embedded in the bank of the Saint John River near the mouth of the Maciniquac stream, it was reported here today. The gruesome discovery was made by Joseph Holland on the farm of Eldon Currie.

The skeleton is believed to be that of a man. The head is reported missing, but all the rest of the bones are complete with the exception of one rib, which also could not be found.

Louis Burden was the son of George F. Burden, ex-M.L.A., and brother of E. E. Burden of this city. At the time of his disappearance he had been making his home at the farm of A. L. Slipp of Queensbury. All efforts to locate him at that time were unavailing. The missing man was about 35 years old at the time of his disappearance.

Communication this afternoon with Dr. B. W. Robertson of Keswick Ridge, coroner in this district, resulted in a denial of any knowledge of the discovery.

The Fredericton Detachment, R. C. M. P., is investigating the discovery.

SIX MORE CASES OF POLIOMYELITIS IN N. B. YESTERDAY

New Cases Being Treated in Saint John General Hospital

No New Deaths

Belief Expressed That Schools May Not Open On Monday

The infantile paralysis menace, which has been lying dormant for the past few days, again loomed up large yesterday, as six new cases of the dreaded disease were reported to the Department of Health and Labor here, swelling the total number of cases in the province to 80. No new cases were reported this morning however.

Of the six new cases reported yesterday afternoon, according to the official release this morning, three are in the City of Saint John, two are in Kent County, both in the same family, and one is in Charlotte County.

With the frequency of new cases decreasing for the past week, residents of the southern parts of the province startled today with the sudden increase.

All six cases are being treated in the already overcrowded contagious wards of the Saint John Hospital. More than half the total number of cases in the province are in the Saint John County-Rothsay area.
