## STRIKE ON

work on which these men were engaged was provided by the Provincial Government as a relief measure and the men employed were given this work in order that they might be in a position to support their families after direct relief had ceased to be doled out.

According to schedule, more than 500 workers, employees of Sullivan's Burchill's and O'Brien's, met at 7 a. m. yesterday in front of the I. L. A. hall at Nelson, under the leadership of Mr. McEachern. From there an orderly parade proceeded to Fraser's at Chatham Head, where they were joined by 300 more men, and across the Morrissey Bridge to Newcastle where they paraded through the business section. Following this the body proceeded to Chatham where a similar demonstration was given.

At each centre the numbers increased. In the afternoon the officials and some of the strikers visited St. Margaret's and tied up road work.

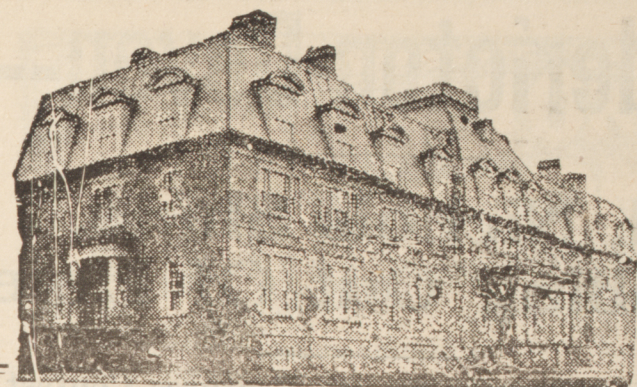
While there Mr. McEachern had a conference with Mr. Rayner concerning the wages paid his men, the union chairman said. The contractor laid all the blame on the present government, which had set the scale of wages at 25 cents per hour, with no definite time limit as to hours, he stated. Mr. Rayner was said to be of the opinion that the strike should be settled as quickly and amicably as possible, as it was the employer who would suffer in the present situation. Later yesterday afternoon the parade proceeded to Loggieville, where 150 workers joined the ranks. Here it was learned that the Loggie Co. had already boarded up their saw mill for the winter, but no alarm was felt, as it was the opinion that operations would be resumed as soon as a settlement is reached.

The demonstration was orderly and members of the R. C. M. P. were on patrol, but did not have to intervene. It has been 13 years since the Miramichi has witnessed such a demonstration, when, under the International Longshoremen's Association, laborers struck for higher wages, which were forthcoming within a few days. A small outbreak occurred four years ago.

John S. Martin, vice-president of the union, member of the Chatham Common Council and a former M.L.A., when approached this afternoon stated: "The situation we are now in is one that the government could very easily correct. I personally have proposed at a Board of Trade meeting yesterday that the four legislature members from this district be asked to resign in protest to the government's lack of action."

## Premier Invited

Mr. Martin further stated that he had foreseen this trouble for some time as had most of the people interested. "At a meeting yesterday of the leading citizens of Chatham, aldermen and members of the Board of Trade, all leading citizens of the district, to discuss the industrial and economic conditions of the town, it was moved by J. Kerr Loggie of Chatham that the premier and the minister of lands and mines, F. W. Pirie, be invited to come to Chatham and discuss the situation."

united by a common interest in the conservation and management of our forests. Since that time the membership of the Society has increased to more than 400, most of whom are graduates of one of the Canadian Forest Schools.

The need for greater co-operation in the study of local problems has led to the organization of groups of members called Sections of the Society in various parts of Canada. The New Brunswick Section was organized in the spring of 1937 and includes in its membership about 40 members of the Canadian Society of Forest Engineers residing in this Province.

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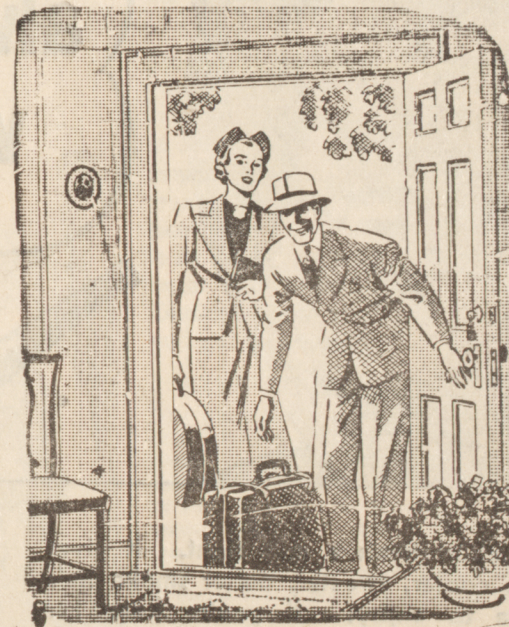
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
