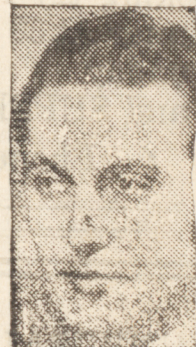
They're heard on the Sunday Night Party broadcasts over the NBC-Red Network at 10:00 p. m., EDTST.

JANSSEN ADDS FILM STAR AS NEW SOLOIST

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 21—From his Welsh ancestors, Allan Jones inherited a glorious tenor voice. From his experience as a concert star he got the poise and confidence which, added to the voice, have made him a star in the movies.

Now Allan Jones is heard regularly on the radio for the first time in his career. He has been signed as a regular soloist on the Fleischmann program in the series of concerts from Hollywood conducted by Werner Janssen and broadcast over the NBC-Blue Network each Sunday at 7:30 p. m., EDTST.

The career of this young singer began with vocal studies in his native city of Scranton, Pa. At the age of 16, he won the tenor solo competition at the National Welsh Eisteddfod in Philadelphia. Engagements as church soloist in Scranton followed. In 1926 he began studies in New York. Later he toured the country singing concerts, oratorio and opera. It was the picture version of 'Show Boat' which made him a star in the movies.

CELEBRATED CELLIST

Georges Miquelle, the distinguished cellist, will be heard over the national network of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation in recital, on Sunday, August 22, at 5:45 p. m. EDT. M. Miquelle, acclaimed following his recent New York recital, as "an artist of the very first order", is a native of Lille, France, and made his first appearance on his continent as solo cellist with the Boston Symphony Orchestra. He has appeared as guest conductor with leading American and Canadian orchestras, notably those of Detroit and Toronto.

For his recital over the Canadian network he will play the Sonata in A Major for cello and piano, by Boccherini, with Mary Manning as assistant artist. His program will also include Malaguena, by Albeniz and Panillon, by David Popper.

Georges Miquelle enjoys a brilliant international reputation, he is well known to radio audiences, having been on leading Columbia and NBC programs and he has toured Canada, the United States and Mexico as a concert soloist.

Monday—Gracie Allen is 'in conference'. And the famous aspirant impresario will call together her ultra-modern designer, Edith Kiviette; the fenzied French producer, Pierre; and songwriters Gargle and Dribble and go 'in conference' to end them all—on the Burns and Allen broadcast Monday, August 23, at 8:00 P. M., EDTST, over the WEA-FNBC network.

La Allen will discuss final preparations for her super-sensational cinematic revusical, 'Robin Hood Follies', and her staff—as well as silent advisor George Burns—will attempt to put in their two cents' worth when Gracie isn't looking.

Soloist Tony Martin's vocal selections and Ray Noble's orchestral interludes will provide diversion during Producer Allen's significant pauses.

Wednesday—Jessica Dragonette, with Robert Weede as supporting artist, will present the second and concluding installment of Rudolf Primi's musical romance, 'The Three Musketeers', on the 'Beauty Box Theatre' presentation, Wednesday, August 25, at 9:30 P. M. EDTST, over the WABC-CBS network.

Among the vocal highlights, accompanied by Al Goodman and a symphonic orchestra, will be Miss Dragonette's singing of the Primi songs: 'Ma Belle,' 'Love is the Sun,' 'Your Eyes,' and 'Every Little While.' In addition, she will sing Ben Jonson's 'Drink To Me Only With Thine Eyes.'

Saturday—Because the existing set-up of the Prof. Quiz program does not give Arthur Godfrey the opportunity for the ad-libbing and spontaneous word-maneuvring which brought him fame and recognition as an unusual radio personality, Godfrey and his sponsor company when the Quiz broadcast begins its new series after the program of August 28th.

While the Prof. Quiz presentation was still a sustaining show, Bob Trout and the Prof. carried on a running fire of amusing back-chat and ad-lib talk, which is exactly the sort of high-jinks for which Godfrey has become known on his Sun Dial program over Washington, D. C.'s WJSV. Over 80 sponsors attest the popularity and effectiveness of his spontaneous chatter.
