CHICAGO, Nov. 10—All the states in the Union, all the provinces of Canada, and a dozen foreign countries are represented in the long list of schools, student groups and individual pupils who have requested textbooks and indicated they will tune in each Tuesday to study music during Dr. Joseph E. Maddy's Fun in Music program series.

The demand for piano instruction books has been so heavy that the first printing has already been exhausted, according to Judith Waller, NBC Central Division Education Director, although the program (heard Tuesdays over the NBC-Red Network at 2:00 p. m., AST), was resumed only last October 12.

This is the first season Dr. Maddy's music lesson series, now in its second year over NBC networks and in its eighth year on the air, has included instruction in piano and voice. Heretofore instruction was only for band instruments.

In presenting his broadcasts, Dr. Maddy is assisted by professional singers and musicians. They sound the correct tones for the guidance of pupils at their receiving sets.

KOSTELANETZ TO FEATURE FAMOUS "VICTORY BALL"

"The cymbals crash,
The dancers walk . . .
And shadows of dead men
Watching 'em there . . .
Victory, Victory
On with the Dance!"

"Victory Ball", Ernest Schelling's powerfully dramatic composition, was inspired by the poem of which the above lines are fragments, Alfred Noyes' 'A Victory Dance', written in 1919. Andre Kostelanetz will present 'Victory Ball' as a feature of his Armistice Eve 'Listeners' Digest' broadcast, tonight at 10:00 P. M., AST, over the WABC-CBS network.

Guest artist of the program will be Bidu Sayao, Metropolitan operatic soprano, famous for her interpretation of the title role in 'Madame Butterfly'. She will sing 'One Fine Day', from the Puccini work.

As a tribute to Miss Sayao, a Brazilian, maestro Kostelanetz opens the program with the overture, 'Il Guarany', by Gomez, one of her native land's outstanding composers. The works of two other Brazilian composers will be featured among the singer's own selections. 'Para Ninar', by De Paulillo Barroso and 'El Clave-

Another orchestral feature of the Kostelanetz 'Listeners' Digest' will be the Overture from Richard Wagner's rollicking comic opera, 'Die Meistersinger'.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10—If you set your alarm a little ahead of time on Friday, November 26, you'll be able to catch the premiere performance of Schumann's 'Lost Concerto' for violin and orchestra before you leave for the office.

The concerto, recently discovered in the archives of the Berlin State Library, will be given in a special performance of the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra, and will be heard in this country exclusively over the NBC-Red Network from 8:05 to 8:45 a. m., AST. The NBC networks normally begin operations at 8:30 a. m., AST.

The premiere of now famous composition had previously been announced for October 20 by the BBC Symphony Orchestra with Jelly d'Aranyi as the solo performer. Almost at the same time the American press carried the story that Yehudi Menuhin had received first performance rights and would play the work November 12 with the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra. German government authorities, however, decided that the premiere should take place in Germany. Through negotiations with the Reichs Rundfunk Gesellschaft, NBC obtained exclusive broadcast rights for the United States.

"Streamline" Will Feature Many Favorites

'Streamline', musical presentation featuring a modern orchestra under the direction of Percy Faith with Dorothy Alt, contralto, and the 'Fashionaires', novelty vocal trio, will be broadcast from the Toronto studios over the national network if the CBC on Thursday, November 11, at 10:00 p. m. AST.

The 25-piece orchestra will play a group of numbers specially arranged by Mr. Faith, including 'Alexander's Ragtime Band', the song that started Irving Berlin on the road to fame; Peter Wenrich's famous ballad 'Put On Your Old Gray Bonnet', and Reginald Forsythe's 'Serenade for a Wealthy Widow'.

Miss Alt, who is a reigning favorite on the Canadian airwaves, will sing Teddy Powell's popular hit, 'Tears In My Heart', and Milton Ager's 'If I Can Count On You'. The 'Fashionaires' will offer the latest swing tune 'Bob White, Whatcha Gonna Swing Tonite' and 'I'm Olga from the Volga' from the picture 'Thin Ice'.

Betty Winkler, actress on Edgar Guest's 'It Can Be Done' programs, occasionally acts as the poet's studio secretary, too, and types out many of his scripts.

YOUTH PEACE DAY TO BE CELEBRATED BY CBC BROADCAST

Several Prominent Speakers Will Be On Air; Will Stress Need of Joint Youth Action

OTTAWA, Nov. 10—International Youth Peace Day, scheduled for November 10, will be celebrated during a special broadcast to be presented over the national network of the CBC from 4.45 to 5.00 AST, when two leaders of the Youth Congress Movement speak on peace. The speakers will be Margaret Eddy, representing the United Church Young People's Society, and Norman Levy, English-speaking co-chairman of the Canadian Youth Congress Movement.

International Youth Peace Day will be celebrated throughout the world by young people representing every type of peace sentiment. Through the Canadian Youth Congress, which unites all major youth organizations of Canada, young people will give proof of their loyalty to the ideals of peace and collective security.

Chief emphasis in the messages to be brought to Canadian youth will be the need for a realistic approach to the problems confronting the world. The main theme, it is expected, will be collective security and collective action by nations and the peoples against any aggression. The need for concrete action by Canada's youth in the face of the Sino-Japanese crisis, and unity among all peace loving peoples, will be stressed.

Legion Broadcasts On Armistice Day

Annual Armistice Day ceremonies of the American Legion at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier here will be broadcast over the NBC-Blue Network in a full hour program beginning at 1.00 p. m., AST, on Thursday, November 11.

Louis Johnson, Assistant Secretary of War; Daniel J. Doherty, national commander of the American Legion and Mrs. Malcolm Douglas, new president of the American Legion Auxiliary, will be principal speakers. Music will be furnished by the Marine Corps Band and Lucy Monroe, noted soprano star of radio and opera, will be soloist.
