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**NEW "GOLD" TOWN ARISES  
IN BURNED-OVER FOREST**

Homes Are All Log Cabins and Tar-Paper Shacks  
—Main Street Just Happened at Wendigo

KENORA, Nov. 10—The forest wilderness of the Northwest has given another new 'old' town to Ontario. Within little more than a year has Wendigo grown up on ground swept clean in 1935 by a forest fire, which wiped out some of the buildings of the then infant mine.

Principal producer of the Kenora district, Wendigo Gold Mine supports a populace of about 150 persons, including twenty-two families, compared to none when the property entered the productive stage little more than a year ago.

Wendigo is the typical 'bush' village, a gathering of tarpaper shacks and log cabins. The main street just happened. When the mine required firewood several years ago a trail found its way from the bush, along the lakeshore, then back for half a mile to the mine. The mud and turns which marked it as a forest trail remain to serve as 'the' street.

When the mine reached production the first home to go up was a \$2,000 log mansion on the shore of the lake. It still remains the finest house in the village.

The growth has been so fast in recent months that the mine company is now preparing to survey a townsite. The first business, a grocery store, with a few of the general lines, has opened up, while a school is talked about for the eight or ten children eligible and also to take care of the large number of other miners' sons and daughters who will be old enough soon.

Some of the optimists bought cars in over frozen trails last winter just before the snow came, having heard the promise that a highway would be built this year from Kenora. Construction is proceeding but will not be completed for some time yet, so the car owners confine their evening's drive to a half-mile run from the village to the mine. More recently, however, two miles of the highway has been opened to add to the joys of bush motoring. Most of the traffic, however, still consists of horse-drawn wagons, loaded with wood, for next to mining, the town's No. 2 industry is woodcutting.

In addition to fuel for the homes in the village, and the bunkhouses for single men, considerable wood is required in the steam boilers that supply some of the power for mining operations as hydro power is not available.

A few families have taken advantage of the location of their houses along the shore of the lake to put in flowers and lawns, strangely unexpected in such a community. Rock gardens exist, naturally. One family has built a rustic bench and fences are being erected. Another has im-

ported a flock of hens which help supply the camp with fresh eggs, the only commodity which need not be fully imported.

The village store serves as a community meeting place. Young and old miner and prospector, sweethearts and wives and children meet there.

Wendigo is still growing. A new street is beginning to take shape with two houses already built on it. As yet there are no modern conveniences. Electricity will likely be the first to come, but not immediately, as the mine power is limited until hydro energy comes.

This mining camp, like most others is essentially one of youth. The oldest persons can be described as no more than middle-aged, the exception being the popular 'Hutch' 60 year old prospector, who has been living with his wife for many years three miles back in the bush on a property which 'Hutch' is confident, will some day be a mine, turning out gold bricks just like Wendigo.

**TRIP TO THEATRE OF WAR  
IS PART OF HONEYMOON**

Sir Evelyn and Lady Wrench In Toronto After Adventurous Visit to Orient

TORONTO, Nov. 10—Good sport though she is, Lady Wrench admitted on arrival in Toronto yesterday that she was still recovering her 'breath' after a honeymoon that had taken her into the China war zone and had put her on the same ship as five Chinese murderers and hundreds of the wounded refugees.

"Oh, I enjoyed it. I like to be in on everything," said this charming Englishwoman who won a C.B.E. for her war work. Her husband, Sir Evelyn Wrench, founder of the English Speaking Union and the Overseas League, is back in Toronto for the first time since 1908. He will address the English Speaking Union here tonight.

After spending six months touring Canada, Sir Evelyn has decided that

if he came to Canada to live he would start a Canadian Unity League. "Now, I'm not criticizing you," he said, "I love Canada more than I can tell. And my wife, it's her first visit, she's even more enthusiastic about your country than I am."

"But that spirit of optimism I know when I was here in 1908, where has it gone? Everywhere I go I hear people grumbling about sectional grievances. You're not pulling together. I know I rave about unity, but isn't it the one thing that means peace?"

"Do you know what you need? A few Canadian Henry Fords. I can just see Ford starting this Canadian Unity League. In the Maritimes they say they've been let down. In Quebec the French-speaking people seem to be dissatisfied, probably you've got something to grumble about in Ontario, too."

"Why can't you all pull together? Yes, I have heard about the Rowell Commission. I heartily approve of it. And then I hear people grumble about the duplication of railways. Well, why can't you appoint some competent body to do something about it?"

Both full of a spirit of adventure, they cancelled a trip to Alaska and sailed on the Empress of Britain to the Orient.

They arrived at Shanghai and witnessed the horrible Japanese onslaughts. Hundreds of refugees were brought aboard and placed on mattresses strewn all over the decks.

"And what do you think?" exclaimed Lady Wrench. "They brought five murderers aboard. Four were being taken to Hong Kong to be hanged. They had tried to hang the other man but the rope broke. What a honeymoon!"
