

# Chicago Cubs Defeat Cards to Retain Lead in National League

## Batting Barage in the Ninth Spells Victory

### Yankees Score a Win Over Athletics --- Sox Win

NEW YORK, June 29—Explosive protests of Chicago Cubs intermingled with basehits and runs today as the fighting Bruins whipped the Cardinals 11-9 in St. Louis and kept their leadership of the National League.

The game was won in the ninth inning on three hits off "Dizzy" Dean, a walk and two errors by Mickey Owen, rookie catcher, and the veteran St. Louis captain and shortstop, Leo Durocher.

Dean pitched only the ninth, and fanned the first two, but was charged with the defeat, his seventh of the season against 11 victories. Charlie Root got credit for the victory.

Until the Cub half of the sixth the battle for first place before a ladies day crowd in excess of 20,000 was purely baseball. The Cubs went into that inning trailing by one run and got two of them back before Bill Jurgens was called out at first on a close play. The Cubs stormed on the field and protested to Umpire George Barr. But the decision stood.

In the eighth Jurgens was ejected by Umpire Stewart, after the Cubs had kicked on Stewart's calling a pitch to Johnny Mize a ball, which walked the Cardinal slugger and forced in "Pepper" Martin with a run which put the "Gashouse Gang" in the lead.

With Jim Rippe getting four hits out of five times at bat, New York Giants came from behind to whip the Phillies 4-3 in 10 innings here.

Poor base running by the Reds gave Pittsburgh a 2-1 victory in the first game of a doubleheader in Cincinnati and the Pirates went on a

hitting spree to take the afterpiece 3-6.

Lou Fette, 30 year old rookie right hander, pitched and batted Boston Bees to a 1-0 victory over Brooklyn Dodgers for his ninth triumph of the season. The game went 12 innings.

**Ruffing's Single Wins**  
NEW YORK, June 29—After blasting out homers to keep pace with the Athletics, New York Yankees fell back on a pinch single by Red Ruffing to pull out a 3-2 decision in the ninth inning today.

In Chicago, the White Sox increased their margin over Detroit in the tussle for second place to two full games by whipping the Tigers 3-2, behind Monty Stratton's three-hit pitching.

Sammy Hale's home run led a 13-hit attack on Elton Hogsett and Jack Knott as Cleveland Indians came from behind to defeat St. Louis Browns 7-5 in Cleveland.

Darkness broke up a battle between Washington and Boston in the 12th inning and the game ended in a 2-2 tie.

NEW YORK, June 30—Mike Jacobs—the man with the uncanny knack of translating his dreams into your dollars—gazed into his crystal today and came up with the bland announcement that Joe Louis will make at least \$1,000,000 a year for very year he holds the heavyweight title.

"Yep," emphasized Mike smilingly, "I said one million a year and I mean it. And what's more he'll get it all by fighting."

"Why, he'll make more dough than Jack Dempsey or Gene Tunney ever dreamed about, provided he keeps on winning."

"I've got more bids for his services right now than he can ever possibly fill. I have bids for Joe to fight anybody I select in Brazil, the Argentine, England and in France."

"We'll probably close within the next ten days for a fight in London for late July or early August."

"Max Schmeling? Say, that one's up to Max. If he wants to fight Joe, we'll accommodate him."

"A fight between Schmeling and Louis would draw at least \$1,500,000 in the Yankee Stadium in September."

Gould also revealed that Braddock had cleared more than \$100,000 in his losing fight with Joe Louis.

## Dorothy Round Ousts Helen Jacobs at Play

### Englishwoman is Big Threat in Battle For Title

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 29—Dorothy Round, England's 27 year old top ranking player, pounded Helen Jacobs out of the all-England tennis championship today to threaten for the title the United States has captured eight times in the last ten years.

In a stunning upset Miss Round, daughter of an English clergyman, eliminated Miss Jacobs, the defending champion, 6-4, 6-2, and joined Alice Marble, United States titleholder, Jadwiga Jedzejowska, hard-hitting Polish girl, and Mme. Rene Mathieu of France in the semi-finals. Thursday's pairings will send Miss Marble against Mlle. Jedzejowska and Mme. Mathieu against Miss Round.

It was a day of form reversals but Miss Round's triumph was the greatest. The English Girl, who soon will be married to Dr. Douglas L. Little, held the Wimbledon championship in 1934, but she was seeded only seventh for the current tournament.

Today she hit the peak of her form and the Berkeley, Calif., girl never

had a chance. Miss Jacobs held a 4-2 lead in the first set when the English star began an unstoppable rush. She ran through the four games in a row for the set and then held a 4-1 advantage in the second set. The champion fought back gamely but Miss Round ran her all over the court and then dropped tantalizing shots for point winners. Miss Jacobs seemed to be playing about her usual game but Miss Round's canny play kept her on the defensive.

Miss Marble, seeded fifth, surprised the capacity centre court gallery of 15,000 by eliminating the second seeded German star, Mme. Hilda Krahwinkel Sperling, who is now making her home in Denmark, 7-5, 2-6, 6-3.

Mlle. Jedzejowska, who has beaten Miss Jacobs once and Miss Marble twice this year, had an easy passage into the semi-finals, trouncing Peggy Scriven of England, 6-1, 6-2. Famitsu Nakano and Jiro Yamagishi of Japan defeated R. F. Nichols and D. H. Williams of Great Britain 6-4, 6-0.

Don Budge and Gene Mako of the United States entered the semi-finals with a 6-4, 6-4, 10-8 victory over Christian Boussus and Yvdon Petra of France.

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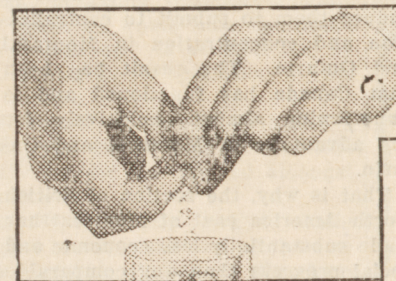
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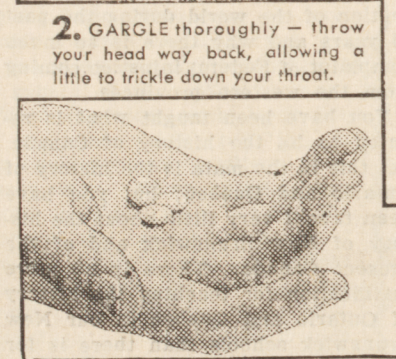
