SEEK LEGISLATION

The second notice is a bill to be presented to the Legislature asking that the same be passed to repeal the Act relating to the Police Commission.

BOARD TRADE URGES FOOTPATH C. N. R. BRIDGE

Wish to Protect and Facilitate Traffic of Passengers

The 1937 Fredericton Board of Trade at its first executive meeting of the new year last night decided to take steps to have a foot-path on the new C.N.R. bridge here and will ask that this be constructed. This will be of great convenience to the residents of South Devon and Barker's Point, as well as to residents in the eastern end of the city, who often use this bridge. In the past the bridge has been used for foot traffic anyway, and it is with the idea in view of eliminating the danger to foot passengers on this bridge that the Board of Trade will move to have the new C.N.R. bridge equipped with a foot-walk.

The executive meeting of the Fredericton Board of Trade was held in the council chamber of the city hall last evening, with the new president, E. C. Atkinson, in the chair. There was a large attendance of the executive, and the following committees were appointed and approved of:

Brown, Riverside, and Miss Carol Alexander, San Diego, and three sons, Claire and Harold, of Riverside, and Dr. Alden Alexander, San Francisco. One daughter predeceased her in California. Burial was made at Riverside.

Perry at the intersection of Brunswick and Westmorland Sts., and which cost the life of Prof. Perry. The pumper, now that it has proven to be in excellent working order, will be put back into service immediately. J. C.
