TO BROADCAST FROM WINNIPEG RAILWAY SHOPS

To Describe Activities At C.N.R. Terminus On Night Shift

October 22nd

A Locomotive Engineer, Snow-plow Crew and Others to Speak

WINNIPEG, Oct. 18.—The clanging of bells on giant locomotives; the hustle and bustle of a large round-house; the intricate and fascinating work of a chief despatcher; a description of the almost human Sperry railcar, and the preparation of huge rotary snow plows for the mountain divisions will be described during the next "Night Shift" broadcast to be presented from Winnipeg to the CBC national network at 9.30 p. m. EST., October 22.

The microphones of the CBC's commentator will be taken into the round-house and shops of the Canadian National Railways at Winnipeg, and in addition to a word and sound picture of what happens at an important terminus, interesting personalities will be interviewed for the benefit of listeners.

Among those to speak will be the engineer of one of the latest 6000 type locomotives who has often been entrusted with the safe transportation of many world-renowned celebrities, the crew of a snow plow, and Capt. R. G. Pickrell, champion revolver shot of the world, and one of the C. N. B.'s most noted policemen.

HALF HOUR OF VERDI MUSIC ON CBC PROGRAM

Tonight at 9.30 p. m. EST., the third in the new series of CBC programmes from the Montreal studios entitled "A Half Hour With..." will feature excerpts from Verdi's Operas. Eugene Chartier will conduct the orchestra for the occasion and the guest singers will be Jeanne Desjardins, soprano, and Allan Burt, baritone.

Miss Desjardins is well known to Canadian radio listeners while Mr. Burt returns from a series of concert and radio engagements in the United States. Frequently heard from the CBC Toronto and Montreal studios, Mr. Burt has established a reputation enhanced by several NBC appearances.

Listed on this all-Verdi programme are the Overture from "Joan of Arc"; the aria "Eri Tu Che Macchiavi" from the "Masqued Ball"; "Pace, Pace" from "La Forza Del Destino"; excerpts from the ballet "Aida," and the "Sanctus" from Verdi's "Requiem."

To Be Co-Featured With Helen Mader and Elwood Hawkins Oct. 17 Over CBC-Blue Hookup

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—Rose Dirman, who "ghosted" the screen singing for such stars as Marion Davies, Kay Francis and Miriam Hopkins, will be heard on the Metropolitan Auditions of the Air program Sunday, October 17, at 6:00 p. m., AST, over the NBC-Blue Network. Miss Dirman, a lyric soprano, will be co-featured with Elwood Hawkins, baritone, of Baltimore, Md., and Helen Mader, contralto, of Brooklyn.

Miss Dirman, in addition to her ghost singing for motion picture favorites, has been heard as soloist in various churches in New York and Los Angeles and with the Los Angeles Philharmonic under the direction of Artur Rodzinski. Miss Dirman is a native of New Orleans.

Studying Law

Elwood Hawkins was a law student at Western Maryland college when he was urged to try for a scholarship in voice at the Peabody Conservatory of Music. He won this and three years later was awarded a scholarship to travel in Europe. In Paris he declined an opportunity to audition for the Opera Comique because he felt he was unprepared for opera at the time. Returning to America, he was brought to the attention of John Charles Thomas, who has coached him since.

Helen Mader has given various concerts in the East. She has often been soloist at New York's historic St. Marks-in-the-Bowery.

R. C. M. P. EPICS FORM BASIS OF RADIO PLAYS

How the honor of the Redskins was vindicated and how the law of the Queen was enforced will be told during this thrilling episode.
