## THIRTEENTH CONCERT FROM CARNEGIE HALL OFFERS DISTINGUISHED ARTISTS

General Motors Concert Next Sunday Will Have Jepson and Dickinson as Soloists; Armando Palacios, S. Amer. Pianist, to Make Radio Debut

The 13th of the broadcasts of the current season of the General Motors Concerts will be transmitted from Carnegie Hall in New York on Sunday evening, December 26th, by a nation-wide hook-up of the NBC-WJZ Blue Network between 9 and 10 p.m. AST.

Two members of the 8 who constitute the General Motors Concert Company will be heard as soloists—Miss Helen Jepson, noted American American soprano, and Donald Dickinson, young American baritone. These company members will be joined by two eminent guest artists, Misha Plastro, concert violinist, and Armando Palacios, a brilliant young concert pianist from South America.

Jepson, Dickinson and Plastro are widely known, but this occasion will be an American radio debut for Palacios. Concerning Palacios, the director of the General Motors Concerts said: "He is one of the most fascinatingly brilliant pianists I have ever heard. I think it entirely possible that within a short time he may be recognized as one of the five greatest of living pianists."

The program will be in the nature of a second "Request Night." A few weeks ago a regularly scheduled "Request Night" was included among the programs of the season, which have this year borne titles indicating the composers, type or nationality of music displayed. Nationally of that program was selected from the most favored numbers mentioned in a number of thousands of letters received from the listening audience in response to an announcement early in the season.

Since that program, however, and increased somewhat by the very program itself, other thousands of requests have continued to arrive, and this second "Request Night" was arranged. Music selected to fit the voices and repertoire of the singers, and the instrument and repertoire of the instrumentalists, from among the selections most requested, will include selections from the works of Strauss, Gounod, Mascagni, Lecuona, Tchaikovsky, Wagner and Massenet. Erno Rapee, conductor of the General Motors Symphony Orchestra and Chorus, will lead those two organizations.

## Brig. General Herbert Montgomery-Campbell Passes Away in England

A telegram received by members of the family here announces the death at Keldon Park, Bath, England, of Brig. General Herbert Montgomery-Campbell, C.B., M.C., at the age of seventy.

Brig. General Campbell was a native of this city and the son of the late Professor Montgomery-Campbell of the faculty of the University of New Brunswick and at one time secretary to Sir Arthur Hamilton Gordon, the last pre-Confederation Governor of this Province. He received his early education in this city and was later graduated from the Royal Military College at Kingston, Ont. Following his graduation he was granted a commission in the Imperial Army and served with the Royal Horse Artillery. He was many years with the army in India and also served in the South African War. During the Great War he served as a staff officer and was severely gassed and wounded.

General Campbell had resided mostly in England, but had visited his home here from time to time. He was a brother of the late Col. Montgomery-Campbell, well known in this city. General Campbell's wife, who was a Miss King, of Quebec survives him. He is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. C. F. Deacon of this city, and Miss Roberts, who resides in Ontario. Four nieces also survive. They are Mrs. Florence Murray and Misses Constance and Annette Montgomery-Campbell of this city, and Mrs. H. F. Morrissey, of Saint John.

General Campbell who was a member of one of Fredericton's oldest families spent his life in the service of his country and served in the army with distinction in different parts of the Empire.

Many of the older residents of Fredericton who will remember the late General Campbell will learn of his death with sincere regret.

CHICAGO, Dec. 23—Dan Harding's

Wife—the popular NBC dramatic serial which was broadcast almost a year over station WMAQ in Chicago under the sponsorship of the National Biscuit Company, will be presented over the NBC-Red Network by the same sponsor beginning Monday, January 3rd.

The program, depicting the problems of a mother who faces alone the task of rearing twin children, will now be heard Mondays through Fridays, at 10:45 a.m., AST.

Previously, Dan Harding's Wife has been heard over the NBC-Red Network on a sustaining basis in addition to WMAQ's sponsored broadcast.

Written by Ken Robinson, NBC Chicago continuity editor, the dramatic series features Isabel Randolph in the title role, with Merrill Fugit and Loretta Poynton playing the parts of the twins whose father is in far-off Iraq on an engineering assignment. The principal roles have been enacted by these three players since the program made its debut over the air on Jan. 20, 1936.

The program will continue to originate in the NBC Chicago studios.

## XMAS IN GERMANY

In Germany whenever it is possible every child has his or her own individual Christmas tree, and each has a separate table on which to place gifts. If circumstances do not allow a separate tree, a large tree is used for the whole household.

Santa Claus is not dressed in red and white as he is in this country. Their Santa Claus is usually dressed in white, wearing a gold crown and a pair of golden wings. On Christmas eve he enters the room where the household is assembled, and presents one member of the house with his or her gift. Then he disappears and re-enters again, and repeats this procedure until all the gifts have been distributed.

The ornaments on the Christmas tree consist largely of sweetmeats called Kringin. These are twisted like the figure eight so they hang easily on the branches of the tree. Other ornaments are imitation fruits and vegetables. They are made of sweet paste such as we usually use for frosting our fruit cakes and is called Almond Paste. These ornaments are so lifelike that they are often mistaken for originals.

The Germans like privacy for their Christmas celebration, and invitations are rarely sent to any, but intimate friends or relatives of the family.

## CANADA 1937 WILL OFFER PREMIER OF TWO SMASH SONGS

Performing Rights For Two Big Hits Given Programme

With approval by American publishers of granting "Canada 1937" permission to feature the world premier broadcast of hits from "The Three Waltzes" on its Xmas Eve broadcast, the Dominion took the music spotlight for the second time in a week. Premier rights, highly valued by band leaders, had been denied other major programs.

Recently, copyright restrictions on "Thanks For the Memory," which until a late moment threatened interference with the regular broadcast of "Canada 1937," were waived by telegram from Eugene Zukor of Paramount, Hollywood, just in time to permit the broadcast to take the air as scheduled. Accordingly the song received its premier on a Canadian program although American producers had been denied rights of performance.

Products of "Canada 1937" in Montreal were informed of the restrictions only shortly before the show was to go on the air. "Phone communication with Manhattan executives failed to bring about a lifting of the ban. Inclusion of the tune in elaborate medley interfered with its elimination from the routine.

Finally an emergency call was made to highest officials of Paramount Pictures in Hollywood. Back came this reply:

"Great pleasure to grant you permission to perform 'Thanks For the Memory.'"
