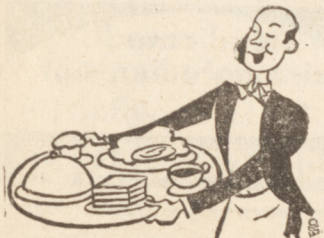

Addresses Rotary Club

**Fruit Growers' Presi-
dent Addresses the
Moncton Rotary Club**

MONCTON, Sept. 13.—(Special)—In
an address before the Moncton Rotary
Club at a luncheon here yesterday,
W. W. Hubbard, Burton, president of
the New Brunswick Fruit Growers' As-
sociation, stressed the need of more
co-operation between the consumers
and the apple growers of the province.

Because of New Brunswick's geo-
graphical position, a long distance
from foreign markets, and the high
cost of transportation, the New Brun-
swick grower must depend on the local
market.

Last year, said Mr. Hubbard, New
Brunswick marketed 18,000 barrels of
apples and imported 30,000 barrels.
This situation should not exist in an
apple growing country, he declared.
