Because of New Brunswick's geo! graphical position, a long distance from foreign markets, and the high will preside over the tea-cups and cost of transportation, the New Brunswick grower must depend on the local market.

Last year, said Mr. Hubbard, New Brunswick marketed 18,000 barrels of apples and imported 30,000 barrels. This situation should not exist in an apple growing country, he declared.




