

Stanley Cup Championships Open Tonight at Madison Square Gardens

New York Rangers at Home to Detroit Red Wings in First Tilt

Gothamites 6-5 Favorites to Win Opener--In Top Form

NEW YORK, April 5—Free of serious injuries, New York's rampaging Rangers tonight awaited the coming of Detroit's champion Red Wings, confident of extending to five games their Stanley cup winning streak when the cup-final opens tomorrow night.

An exultant manager, Lester Patrick said he believed his team had at least a 50-50 chance of clipping the Wings in the best-of-five game series for the world title.

In betting circles, the New Yorkers were 6-5 favorites to take the opener—only game to be played here because a circus moves in Thursday—favorites to retain the championship.

A sell-out crowd of more than 16,000 was already assured for the initial tiling. Tonight the "S R O" sign was hung outside the arena.

The Wings were due to reach the battle scene tomorrow morning.

Patrick said his men had come through the Toronto Leaf and Montreal Maroon series exceptionally well and that there were only a few bruises to show for the New York club's four straight triumphs.

"Considering the remarkable comeback of my players since the playoffs started," Patrick said, "I think we have at least an even chance of winning the cup."

"The recent splendid all-round playing of every man on the club has to be considered. This tips the odds down a little more in favor and I don't think we can be considered long shots against the Wings."

Concerning Broadcasts.

There will be no broadcast of the New York Rangers-Detroit Red Wings hockey game tonight, in the Stanley Cup playoffs, as far as Imperial Oil Limited or the National Broadcasting Company are concerned, officials of those corporations have announced. Imperial Oil stated that as "Canadian teams" were eliminated in the race, they would not be sponsoring further broadcasts this season, and NBC announced that there would be no broadcast to the Canadian network. However, the game tonight and subsequent games may be broadcast by some United States stations.

HOOP OFFICIAL GIVES DECISION

SACKVILLE, April 5—Manager Stanley Gascoigne of the Mt. Allison University basketball squad announced tonight that Robert Brodie, coach of the Mounties, received word from W. E. Desilets and Bill Miller to Play in Exhibition Series

MONTREAL, April 6—Montreal Canadiens, runners-up for the National Hockey League championship, will leave here tonight for an exhibition series in Sydney, N.S., with the New Haven Eagles of the International American League. Manager Cecil Hart announced last night.

The teams will play in Sydney on Thursday and Friday nights of this week, Hart said, with the possibility of a third game Saturday night. The teams have been invited to play in Charlottetown and Halifax next week before disbanding, but arrangements for these games will not be completed until the teams arrive in the Maritimes.

Canadiens' will be intact for the exhibition series, with the possible exception of Aurel Joliat, who has been under doctor's care since the Canadiens were eliminated by Detroit Red Wings last Thursday. Joliat will go along if the club physician gives permission, Hart said.

The Eagles will be bolstered by the addition of several outstanding players of other International-American and National League teams, including Wildor Larochelle of Chicago Black Hawks.

With Canadiens will be two former Maritime amateur stars, Joffre Desilets who played with Saint John Beavers, and Bill Miller of Moncton Hawks.

McGill Grads Have Impressive Record

MONTREAL, April 5—McGill Grads, Montreal Basketball League's Big Six representatives in Dominion senior playdowns, carry an impressive record into their Eastern Canada semi-finals series with St. John Seniors, scheduled for Saint John on April 16 and 17.

Recent victors over University of Ottawa in a home and home series, Grads have piled up 675 points against 480 in 17 games this season, giving them a formidable game average of 39 for and 28 against.

Saint John Hoopsters Defeat Newcastle in Provincial Play-offs

Loyalist Troops Win the New Brunswick Hoop Crown 47-33

SAINT JOHN, April 6—Flashing a smart passing attack and a superior brand of shooting both under the hoop and from the defence zone, the Saint John '34 Club came through with a decisive 47-33 win over the Newcastle Bachelors to take the New Brunswick intermediate basketball title last night. The locals took the first contest at Newcastle Saturday night, 44-39, and will now meet the Glace Bay Crusaders for the Maritime crown.

The losers displayed a fast, tricky system of passing and a smooth working defence but they were away off in their shooting, while the locals drilled them with consistent accuracy to step into an early lead and hold their opening margin. Capitalizing on the superior reach of Tait and Cramm they staged a series of snappy passing plays starting at the centre tip-off and ending under the Newcastle cage. Only for a few brief minutes in the final session, when the visitors beat the hoop for three rapid-fire tosses from the tip-off were the locals threatened.

Tait lanky forward of the '34 Club, and Cramm, a teammate, shone for the locals and led all scorers with 14 and 9 points. Jarvis led the North Shore sharpshooters with eight tallies and Pell was close on his heels with seven.

Pell Opens Scoring

Pell cut the Saint John margin for the round to three points when he opened the scoring with a nice marker on a three-way pass starting from the tip-off, but Patterson came back with the equalizer a few seconds later on a long toss from the side. Newcastle started to flash a nice feinting system and bouncing pass, with Smofsky and Pell flinging them from

both hands to miss the hoop on several close ones. Tait scored two free throws to bring the Saint John total to four and give them the edge the Newcastle squad never overcame. Cramm and Ralston came back with two jump shots under the hoop and another foul shot to bring the score up a few more notches. Newcastle continued to muffle their scoring chances and their overthrows were taking the sting from fast scoring drives. The trailing North Shore squad called for time after Malcolm caught the whole quintet flatfooted to break away for a "sucker shot."

Jarvis started a Newcastle spurge after the resumption of play on a nice shot from the foul line, but Malcolm broke away again to notch up the equalizer. Jarvis then came back for his second tally in two minutes when he battled in a rebound, and Tait and Patterson sunk two beautiful long shots without touching the rim.
