members of the executive, F. E. MacAlpine, Upper Hampstead; Frederick Smith, Long Reach, and W. B. Gilman, Springhill.

Among other resolutions of the meeting, it was decided to hold a one-day meeting in April, shortly before the spraying season, to discuss the matter. It was also resolved that the provincial Department of Agriculture be urged to continue the application of maggot control measures, and that a study be made in the coming year and information be obtained on warehouse ventilation, cold and gas storage precooling as effecting apple storage, shipments, and marketing of New Brunswick fruit.

One other resolution of importance to the apple growers was that requesting that other spray materials be placed on the same scale as nicotine sulphate and be allowed into Canada from all countries free of duty.

Addresses Given

Col. R. L. Wheeler, Dominion Fruit Trade Commission, Ottawa, discussed inspection and marketing legislation. A talk on precooling, warehouse ventilation and gas storage was given by C. A. Eaves of the Dominion Experimental Station, Kentville, N.S. C. W. Maxwell of the entomological laboratory, this city, discussed 'Ferrox Flotation Sulphur Calendars vs. Calendars of Standard.'

The report on 'Advertising New Brunswick Apples,' which was prepared by Mr. Hubbard, was read by Mr. Slipp, who presided.

Encouraging was the report of the committee on apple maggot investigation, which was also given by Mr. Slipp. In the work, which was carried out during the past summer, only one infested McIntosh group was found in 42 orchards inspected.

The suggestion that a display of New Brunswick apples be entered in the Maritime Winter Fair at Amherst was left to the consideration of the newly appointed executive.

Mrs. Kenneth I. Campbell, regent of the Saint John Municipal Chapter, said last night:

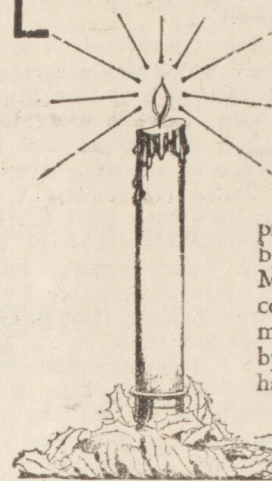

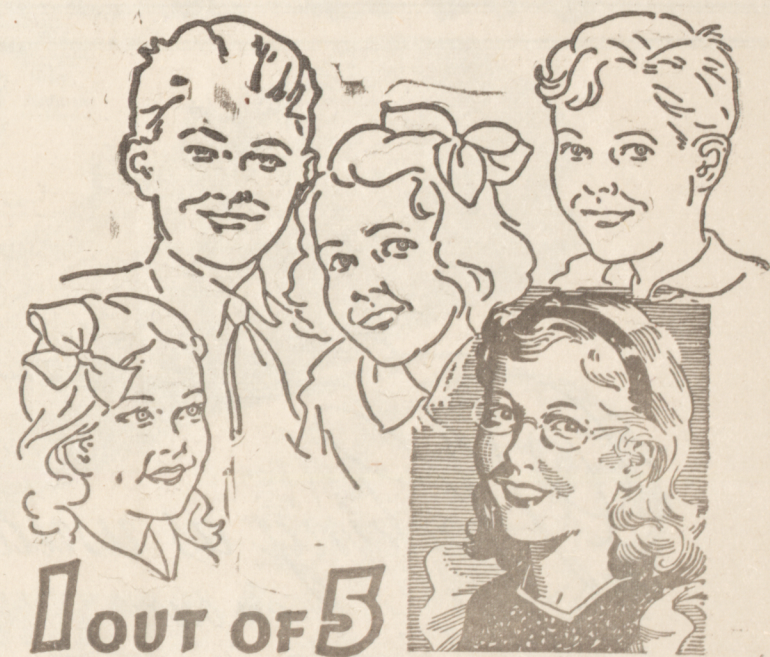
