## THE MRS. WON'T KNOW YOU



Not even your own wife could recognize your voice over the "voice-disguiser" introduced by Sedley Brown on his Husbands and Wives program over NBC. The apparatus, which Brown is shown demonstrating, enables a husband or wife to talk with complete frankness on domestic problems without fear of being recognized by his or her mate.

NEW YORK, June 3—For people who want to talk on the Husbands and Wives programme and don't want a wife or husband to guess their identity by recognizing the voice, Sedley Brown has collaborated with radio engineers on a "voice-disguiser."

It has already been used several times with complete success—nobody recognizes the voice. And now Brown keeps it in reserve for use whenever an embarrassing question like "How can a husband cure a nagging wife?" comes up.

Using the voice-disguiser, almost anyone will talk with complete frankness, Brown says.

The weekly meetings of Husbands and Wives are conducted by Sedley Brown and Allie Lowe Miles with the former interviewing the husbands and the latter, the wives. The broadcasts over the NBC-Blue network each Tuesday at 8 p.m., EDT, are sponsored by Pond's.

The voice-disguiser introduces several filters into the microphone circuit which take certain tones out of the voice and alter its quality completely. In a test Allie Lowe Miles couldn't even pick Brown's voice out of three she heard.



quired from Germany through a plebiscite ordered in the Treaty of Versailles. Christian is King of Iceland as well as of Denmark, but under his reign Iceland, which has been under Danish rule since the Fourteenth Century, was acknowledged in 1918 to be a sovereign State, united to Denmark only through having a common sovereign.  
Like Britain, Denmark and the other Scandinavian States have been able to reconcile monarchy and parliamentary democracy.
