Using the voice disguiser, almost anyone will talk with complete frankness, Brown says.

The voice disguiser introduces several filters into the microphone circuit which take certain tones out of the voice and alter its quality completely. In a test Allie Lowe Miles couldn't even pick Brown's voice out of three she heard.
