

# Veterans Must Unite Against War, Says Mayor of Glace Bay

## Speaks at 16th Annual Re-union of 36th Battery, C.E.F.

**Denies Legion Connected With Army — Service Held At Cenotaph — Dugald McDonald Elected President.**

"We must present a united front against war, which has brought more misery to the world than anything else," stated Mayor D. W. Morrison of Glace Bay, N. S., in denying that the Canadian Legion is an adjunct to the "war machine." Mayor Morrison spoke at the banquet of the 16th annual reunion of the 36th Battery, C. E. F., held at the Waverly hotel last night.

Yesterday was the first time since it left for overseas in February, 1916, that the Battery has been in Fredericton as a body, and the first time that many of the members have visited the Capital City in 12 years.

Colonel D. A. MacKinnon, Charlottetown, P. E. I., was elected honorary president of the Battery Association last night. Col. MacKinnon was the commanding officer of the Battery in France. Dugald McDonald was elected president, replacing William

Thompson, Sydney, while Joseph Desaulnier, Fredericton, was chosen honorary vice-president, Frank Christie and James R. Morrison, both of Sydney, were re-elected vice-president and secretary-treasurer respectively.

### Service at Cenotaph

Yesterday morning the members of the Battery, two score strong, marched down Queen Street from the Canadian Legion Buildings to the Cenotaph, where a service in memory of the departed comrades of the veterans was conducted by Rev. Dr. J. W. Bartlett.

A wreath was laid on the stone by J. R. Morrison, secretary-treasurer of the Association. Last Post and Reveille were blown by Bugler Jack Forester of this city.

Mayor D. W. Morrison, Glace Bay, delivered an address in which he referred to the months spent in Fredericton 21 years ago. He said that the members of the Battery had been received by the citizens of Fredericton with a kind hospitality which they would long remember. He referred to the men who had been here in the winter of 1915-16, and who are now sleeping in Flanders Fields, and stated that the Association placing the wreath not only in memory of those comrades, but also in memory of those whose names were inscribed on the Cenotaph.

After offering prayer, Rev. Dr. Bartlett paid a tribute to those who had given their lives in the Great War. He said that the last war was a war to end wars, and urged all those present to work for peace. He said that unless those who had fought in the Great War as well as all others would work unitedly for peace, their comrades would have died in vain.

The 36th Battery trained in this city in the early days of the war, arriving October 1, 1915, and leaving on Feb. 20, 1916. On Feb. 26 the unit embarked from Saint John for England, where it trained for four months more. The members of the unit served in France for over two years, on almost all portions of the Western Front. The present association boasts approximately 100 members, of whom only about 45 were present yesterday. Most of the members of the Battery were recruited in the Sydney-Glace Bay district of Nova Scotia, although a few local men served with it. While here, they were

quartered in the old barracks adjoining the armouries.

Before the banquet, a silence of one minute was observed in memory of the deceased members of the Battery. After the meal President Thompson expressed in his presidential address his pleasure in returning to Fredericton after an absence of so many years. The financial statement was then read by the secretary-treasurer.

**"Splendid Courage And Devotion"**  
The following is an excerpt from the letter sent to the Battery Association by Col. D. A. MacKinnon, who was the commanding officer of the unit during wartime:

The years are rolling by, nearly nineteen have elapsed since I said good-bye to you that November day, 1918, near Mons. The words I spoke to you then when I thanked you and told you how good and loyal you had been to me and how I could never forget the splendid courage and devotion to duty you showed at all times, are as true today as when uttered. No officer, I am sure, had a better battery than the 36th, and I am indeed lucky to be given the opportunity of commanding it.

Letters and telegrams from many other members of the Battery who were unable to be present yesterday were then read, as well as the original list of men who went overseas with the Battery in 1916. The following members of the executive for the coming years were elected: John McInnis, Walter Blair, Harry Higdon, Thomas Curry, Murdoch McPhee, Bayard Simmons, James McDonald and Robert Goss. A vote of thanks was extended to J. R. Morrison for his many years as secretary-treasurer.

**Urges Continuance of Reunions**  
In proposing his toast to the Battery, Mayor Morrison urged the continuance of the reunions "as long as there are half a dozen left", noting the great friendships formed among the members of the unit. After stating that the World War veterans must present a united front against war, the speaker continued to claim that war cannot settle international differences. "If disputes cannot be settled by any other means but war, then this so-called civilisation of ours is a sham", he exclaimed.

A telegram from Premier Angus L. MacDonald of Nova Scotia was then read, who commented on the splendid reputation of the members of the Battery in peace as well as in war. W. A. Gibson, president of the Fredericton Branch of the Canadian Legion, supported the anti-war sentiments expressed by Mayor Morrison. Other speakers included Major Blair and John Cain, both members of the old Battery living in this city.
