## Four Convicted of Drunkenness, One of Theft, At Police Court

Four cases were on the police court this morning, a dealing with drunkenness and one also dealing with theft.

A fine of \$100 and costs or a sentence of 30 days in jail was imposed in the first case, that of a man charged with having liquor in an unauthorized place, while another man charged with being in an intoxicated condition on a public highway was fined \$5 and costs or ordered to spend one month in jail.

Arrests were made in both cases on Saturday night by Const. Lee Mathelet, Fredericton Detachment, R. C. M. P., in the parish of St. Marys.

Duncan McGinnis appeared charged with drunkenness, having been remanded from Saturday's court. A sentence of two months in jail was imposed. The magistrate stated that the convicted man would be allowed his freedom, and that in 24 hours commitment papers would be handed to the police, and if McGinnis was found in the city, the commitment would be carried out.

James Levine was fined \$8 or sentenced to serve 30 days when he pleaded guilty of drunkenness and was sentenced to spend 30 days in jail when he pleaded guilty of the theft of a pipe from Crowley's Tobacco Store.


