

# The New York Giants Clamp Tighter Grip on National League Lead

## DOUBLE VICTORY OVER PHILLIES PUTS GIANTS THREE GAMES UP ON THE CUBS

Cincinnati Takes Two From Cubs — Bees, Cards Split With Dodgers and Pirates — Yanks Win Twice From A's—Senators, Indians, Red Sox, and White Sox Break Even.

NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—The Giants solidified their grip on first place in the National League today as they swept to a double victory over Philadelphia Phillies, 6-2 and 9-3. The victories pushed the Giants' lead to three full games over the Chicago Cubs, who split with Cincinnati.

Lefty Lee Grissom, Cincinnati's star freshman, held the slumping Cubs to one hit, but that lone blow—a pop fly double by Phil Cavaretta at the start of the eighth inning—led to a two-run "rally" that beat him 2-1, in the second game of a holiday double-header before 29,694 Chicago fans.

The game ended a five-game losing streak for the Chicagoans. Paul Deringer beat them, 7-3, in the opener.

Lou Fette, Boston Bees' 31-year-old rookie, hurled his 17th victory of the season to trim the Dodgers 6-4 and give the Bees an even break in a holiday double-header in Brooklyn. Brooklyn won the opener 2-1 in 10

ST. STEPHEN, Sept. 6.—The fifth and deciding game in the New Brunswick baseball semi-finals between St. Croix and Minto will be played here tomorrow afternoon, starting at 4:30 o'clock. William T. Warwick, president of the N. B. Baseball Association announced tonight.

The game had been hanging fire until Mr. Whitlock made his announcement after receiving word from Clem O'Connor, secretary of the Association, in Saint John that Minto would go to the border tomorrow after certain alterations, requested by the Minto management, were granted.

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## Whitehead Rated As the Giants' "Iron Man"

Frail Infielder of Terrymen Has Played in 270 Major League Games

There are iron men in this baseball game, and iron man, Lou Gehrig, has played more than nineteen major league games without miss. And the Polo Ground clients find something to talk about in the fact that Burgess Whitehead's name has appeared in the last 270 Giant box scores.

There's a difference, of course. About twelve years in time, and more energy, strength and actual playing manoeuvres than anybody can possibly estimate.

But all records are relative, and Whitehead can point with as much pride to his record as can the Yankee titan to his most remarkable of all the endurance marks.

Gehrig is a physical giant, strong, muscular, sturdy, a superman immune to the ills and ailments that befall the ordinary mortals. Whitehead is frail, thin and spindly, tipping the beam at no more than 150 pounds when he steps onto the locker room scales.

Thus it's been an achievement for him to play 270 consecutive games for the Giants through two seasons. None of his teammates have done it, and without exceptions they are bigger stronger men than he.
