Betty Wragge, pretty ingenue in 'Pepper Young's Family,' NBC script program, started her professional career when three years old. Played in the silent picture, 'Yolanda,' with Marlon Davies. First stage experience at the age of seven in 'The Comedienne' with Charlotte Walker on Broadway. Initial air program with brother Eddie, 17 years old, in 1927 with Raymond Knight. Has worked with Richard Barthelmess, Gloria Swanson, Babe Daniels, Ben Lyon, Milton Sills and other stars of the silent film days. David Belasco predicted a bright future for her when she was 11. She now is studying dancing. Has a great autograph collection of celebrities she has appeared with. Doesn't like actors who chew gum while playing a scene opposite her on the air. Short takes: Five feet five; 118 pounds; dark blonde hair and blue eyes; likes perfume, is not superstitious and would like to be a fashion designer or interior decorator.

Phil Baker, now one of radio's foremost comedians, first gained attention as a pianist for a violin act. Became a star during the World War. The uniform did something to him and he started to speak lines on the stage. Then came a long string of musical comedy appearances. Was teamed on occasions with Ben Bernie, Bert Lahr and Morton Downey. Doesn't like to be called a comedian. Dotes on playing the accordion. Appeared at the old Palace Theatre, then the vaudeville mecca, for 12 consecutive weeks and became the first \$5,000 a week headliner in history. Short takes: Has three children. Spain, Sept. 4.—The Insurgents have issued a report regarding submarine attacks in the Mediterranean.
