Ranger Wins Second Straight Cup Race

Defeats Endeavour II In BASEBALL Yacht Classic

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 2-Harold Vanderbilt's Ranger today established herself as a faster boat in light weather on and off the wind as she took the second of a best-of-seven race series for the America's Cup from T. O. M. Sopwith's British challenger. Endeavour II.

The big American sloop won as easily as it did in the first race of yacht's world series, last Saturday and Sopwith asked for a one-day postpone-Renewal ment which was granted. of Britain's 16th challenge will be made Wednesday. It was expected changes would be made in the bluehulled craft with which Sopwith hopes to regain the trophy for the first time since the schooner America triumphed in 1851.

Ranger sailed the 30-mile triangular course in three hours, 41 minutes and 33 seconds, a margin of 18 minutes and 32 seconds over Endeavour.

Saturday the American yacht won over a 30-mile windward-leeward course with a margin of 17 minutes and five seconds.




