## WEEK-END GRIM REAPER LIVES OF MARITIME YOUTHS

The ever present danger of death by drowning has once more been brought forcibly to the attention of the people of the Maritimes in the tragedy of the death of three young people. Two homes were greatly bereaved when in each case their two children went to their deaths by drowning in each case the brother or sister giving their life in an attempt to save the one whom they thought was in danger of being drowned and losing their own life

BUCKINGHAM, Que., Aug. 1-Two young brothers were drowned today in the Lievre River, one in a vain effort to save the other. The dead were George Cleere, 16, and his 13 year old brother, Lucien.

The two boys, members of a picnic party, swimming after dinner, brother jumped in to save him but Lucien grabbed him around the neck and both went under. About half an hour later both bodies were recovered but artificial respiration failed.

CHARLOTTETOWN Aug. 1-Shir ey Hooper ,10, and her eight year old sister, Rosalie, children of Lieut. Col. J. P. Hooper of Charlottetown, were drowned at Stanhope Beach, 20 miles from here today. Verna Vail, a playmate, was rescued by Randolph Carruthers, also of Charlotte-

The children were caught in a powerful undertow as a high wind pounded the surf against the beach. The wind is believed to have drowned the children's cries for help as the surf carried them out.

Carruthers rescued the third child after he saw her struggling in the water as he was passing along the beach. After she had been taken to hotel and revived Col. Hooper said the girl had been playing with his children. After a short search town found Rosalie's body. The oth-

er was found a short time later. After more than an hour of artificial respiration had failed to bring traces of life to the children, they were pronounced dead by Dr. I. J Yeo of Charlottetown.
