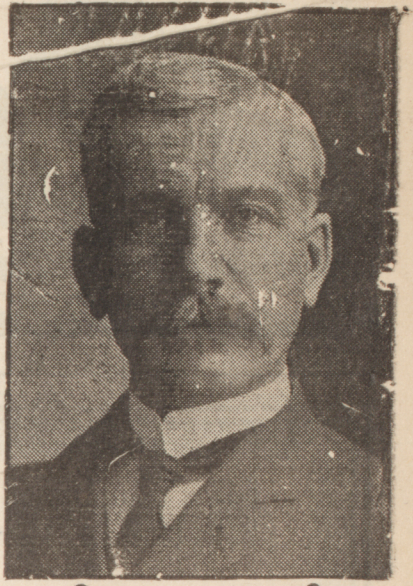

SENATOR GRAHAM HAS WEAK TURN

Was Attending Funeral of Senator Rodolphe Lemieux

MONTREAL, Oct. 2.—Rt. Hon. George P. Graham, elder member of the Canadian Senate, suffered a weak spell while attending the funeral of Senator Rodolphe Lemieux.

Mr. Graham, now in his seventy-ninth year, suffered the spell as pallbearers carried the casket from St. James Cathedral to the hearse. Prime Minister Mackenzie King, who with Senator Graham were among the honorary pallbearers, reached out and helped others support Mr. Graham, who was taken to a nearby hotel. He rested for a while and it was announced later that "Senator Graham is feeling a lot better and has just finished lunch."

Senator Lemieux, one of 20th Century French-Canada's most brilliant political figures, was buried with all the symbols of esteem accorded an elder statesman of the Dominion.

Wardens Take Guns and Ducks, Returns Them

The differences between wood ducks and other members of the duck family is a moot question in provincial game warden circles, as the result of the seizure of the guns and ducks of Raymond Currie, a registered guide; Allan Allan and George Chapman, all of this city, yesterday at Sheffield Meadows by Game Wardens Louis Farrell and Mitchell. The three men had ducks in their possession, which they claimed were grey teal, but the wardens, notwithstanding the fact that they could not positively identify the birds, seized them for later identification by Chief Game Warden Col. H. H. Ritchie. The ducks in question had grey backs and were black in the under portions of their bodies.

As a sequel to the seizure, Mr. Allan received word from Game Warden Farrell today that the ducks and guns would be returned to the hunters. Apparently the birds could not be identified here, for Mr. Farrell stated that the department would not take the trouble to send the ducks to Ottawa for identification.

South Africa Gets a Portrait of Princesses

SENATOR HANCE J. LOGAN IS TOO ILL TO APPEAR

Suffered Two Strokes and Is Confined to Hospital; Cannot Answer Court Charges

OTTAWA, Oct. 2.—Serious illness of Senator Hance J. Logan has caused postponement of his preliminary hearing on a fraud charge arising from the celebrated reparations case of the Gypsum Queen which brought an 18-month reformatory sentence to Captain Freeman Hatfield, master of the ship.

When a court attendant called the name of the Parrsboro, N.S., senator, friend of Hatfield and his counsel in the reparations claim that resulted in the government paying \$71,276.72, Roydon Hughes, Logan's counsel said his client had suffered a stroke on Wednesday and was too ill to appear. Logan was remanded for one week, but Hughes said it would be several weeks and possibly months before he is well enough to appear. The senator has been ill for a considerable time with a kidney ailment. Bail of \$5,000 was continued.

BRITISH STRUCK AT OUTLAW ARABS WITH AN IRON FIST

British Government Is Disturbed By Anti-Japanese Cry

Palestine-Arab Situation Is Also Causing Very Grave Concern

Pacific Is Weak Spot

Appeals Are Being Made to Private Members To Appease Popular Disapproval

LONDON, Oct. 2.—Deeply disturbed by the tense Mediterranean situation, and viewing with grave concern the serious unrest among the Palestine Arabs, the British are not anxious to provoke another danger area in the East. The British Cabinet regard quite seriously the rising popular outcry and indignation meetings demanding stern government action against Japan. Efforts are being made by personal appeals of members of the House of Commons to their constituents to appease the swelling tide of popular disapproval to the unrestricted type of war being waged by the Nipponese in the Orient.

The Pacific far more than the Mediterranean is the weak spot of the British Empire at the present time and the problems of the defense of Australia and New Zealand under certain conditions present grave problems.

FOUR MILITARY PRISONERS FLEE, WOUNDING GUARD

(Special to The Daily Mail) SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Oct. 2.—Four military prisoners staged a spectacular jail-break here today. Seizing a shotgun from a guard they made a sudden break for freedom. Three guards in the vicinity fired on the escaping prisoners, who returned the fire wounding one guard. Commanding a nearby truck they fled in the direction of Austin, hotly pursued by state police and military trucks.

Famous Race at New York Park Today

COMMUNIST PLOT IS BARED AT BRAZIL BY SECRET AGENTS

Communist International Caught Making Arrangements For Revolt and Reign of Terror

BRAZIL—Oct. 2.—It is stated that the reason for the invocation of a 60 day period of martial law in Brazil was the publication of a secret document by the Army Secret Service purported to contain full instructions from the Communist Internationale for a revolt which would establish a reign of terror. It contained rumors says full instructions how such a revolt could be successfully accomplished and pointed out the mistakes which had led to the failure of a similar attempt in 1930.

ROBERT IRWIN'S TRIAL STAYED UNTIL OCT. 15

(Special to The Daily Mail) NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—Robert Irwin has gained a further postponement of his trial for the murder of Vera Gedeon until Oct. 15th.

The violent attack made by Irwin on examining members of the Lunacy Commission in which he was only subdued by guards after a 25-minute struggle has caused the postponement.

AMERICAN SOUTH BAPTIST MISSION BOMBED BY JAPS

(Special to The Daily Mail) SHANGHAI, Oct. 2.—The American South Baptist Mission was bombed yesterday by Japanese flyers, severe damage resulting. Six Americans were killed when Japanese planes in their bombing operations bombed the Baden Co. Factory, east of Yangtze-poo.

BARCELONA IS BOMBED AGAIN BY THE REBELS

(Special to The Daily Mail) BARCELONA, Spain, Oct. 2.—12 rebel airplanes subjected Barcelona to one of the heaviest bombardments since the commencement of the civil war in Spain. Three persons were killed and 15 wounded.

(Special to The Daily Mail) BARCELONA, Oct. 2.—Barcelona was heavily bombed by insurgents today and used machine guns on fleeing inhabitants. It is also said considerable number of school children were killed.

Funeral of Railway Official Held Today

TORONTO, Oct. 2.—Amidst feeling of widespread sorrow and with railroaders and railway supply and transport men attending from all over the Dominion, the funeral of the late George Whiteley, Superintendent of Motive Power and Car Department, Eastern Lines, Canadian Pacific Railway, took place at Humber Crost United Church, Baby Point Road, at two o'clock this afternoon following a private service for the immediate family at the residence, 26 Baby Point Crescent, where the remains have been viewed by numbers of his friends since his sudden death from a heart attack early last Wednesday.

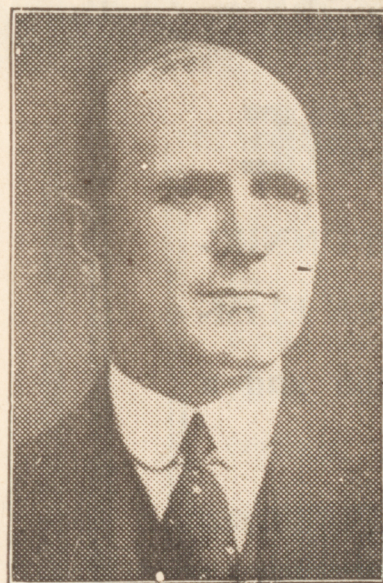
About 350 people are burned to death and a much larger number are injured by fire in Canada every year. The recorded loss of property by fire in Canada during the 15 years, 1921 to 1936, exceeded \$650,000,000. In other words, at our present burning rate, approximately one human life is sacrificed and \$110,000 worth of property is destroyed every day in the year.

Fire is no respecter of persons. Every man has a responsibility towards his neighbors and that responsibility should cause every right-thinking person to pause and consider what he owes the community in which he lives. We owe it to ourselves but in a greater degree to our fellow-citizens to permit no condition to exist upon our premises that will invite a visitation of fire. A great majority of fires are so easy to prevent that it is certainly a moral crime to tolerate the things which bring them about.

Cities and towns, like individuals, reap what they sow. To permit the erection of fire-traps, to fail to provide an abundant and reliable water supply and means of using it or to fail to apply the everyday rules of fire prevention, is to constantly face a menace of heavy fires and sweeping conflagrations.

Why tolerate a condition which not only levies tribute upon life and property but in effect imposes an added cost to the conduct of every feature of business activity and increases the burden of the people in providing the necessities of life.

We cannot afford to go on and be indifferent to it all. Fire Prevention Week is a particular week set aside to call attention to the menace of fire. Are you doing your part?



HON. W. D. EULER Minister of Trade and Commerce Announces Better Trade Agreements

HON. W. D. EULER ANNOUNCES TRADE PACTS

Australia and New Zealand Given Concessions In a Variety of Products

OTTAWA, Oct. 2.—Major items such as butter and automobiles remain unaffected by tariff changes becoming effective today on Australian and New Zealand commodities as a result of renewed trade arrangements with the two Antipodean Dominions.

Conclusion of agreements extending the New Zealand agreement for one year from Oct. 1, and revising the Australian agreement which runs indefinitely, announced yesterday by Hon. W. D. Euler, Minister of Trade and Commerce, was accompanied by negotiation of a most favored nation agreement with Guatemala which became effective September 28.

To obtain the consent of Australia and New Zealand to renewed trade relations under existing agreements Canada conceded tariff reductions on a wide range of commodities of both Dominions, notably on fresh lamb and mutton, and Australian wines of the port and sherry types.

The agreement with Guatemala did not involve any specific items but ensures for Canada as favorable tariff treatment as accorded any other country, while Canada gives Guatemala commodities as low tariff rates as those accorded any other foreign countries enjoying Canada's most favored nation trade treatment.

Changes in Women's Hair Is Announced From Paris Today

PARIS, Oct. 2.—A leading hairdresser stated today that during the coming winter two new forms of women's hair styles will predominate. The first is an empire style with hair parted in the middle and corkscrew curls in the back. The second style will be a 19th century one with a puff all over the forehead and rolled in the back with the ears uncovered.

Wholesale Arrests Are Made By Troops In Jerusalem Area

Action Follows The Action of Galilee Commission

Dragnet Thrown Around Officials

Head of High Commission Is Shorn Of His Office and Arrested

ARAB LEADERS WERE ARRESTED BY THE BRITISH

JERUSALEM, Oct. 2.—Following night raids the Arab leaders were taken into custody by the British police. They were taken aboard a British liner and taken to an island in the Indian Ocean. The Jews in the Holy Land are not the only ones that are pleased over the conquering of the Arab leaders. Word comes today from a London paper that the Arabs themselves, that is the common people, are very glad to get away from the territory of the Arab leaders.

JERUSALEM, Oct. 1.—Great Britain struck with an iron fist today to crush a new wave of terrorism in the Holy Land. In sweeping measures, the authorities outlawed the Arab Higher Committee and started rounding up its influential members.

With telephone communication from the city suspended and roads heavily guarded, police carried out their large-scale operations before dawn.

Silently they surrounded houses of Arab leaders and searched the one after the other. Dr. Hussein Khalidi, Mayor of Jerusalem, and Fuad Saba, secretary of the Higher Committee, were reported to have been arrested and taken aboard H.M.S. Sussex at Haifa.

The Grand Mufti of Jerusalem, head of the Higher Committee, was deprived of his office and rumor had him arrested. (There was a report in Cairo, Egypt, that the Mufti had fled to the Mosque of Omar and defied authorities to enter and arrest him.) The manager of an Arabian bank was taken into custody.

Terrorism in the Holy Land reached a climax Sunday when the British Commissioner for Galilee and his bodyguard were assassinated as they left the Anglican Church at Nazareth.

All of Palestine's land frontiers were guarded and troop detachments were on duty at Allenby Bridge and other crossings over the River Jordan.

Major-General A. P. Wavell was in command of the seven battalions of British troops and other land and air forces in Palestine.

It followed quickly on the British rejection of Arab demands for the release of 200 prisoners seized in connection with the slayings at Nazareth.

Troops and police ringed the Haifa district commissioner's office with machine guns and searched the office, reportedly on a tip that secret information had been leaking from there.

The action taken against the Mufti deprived him of the presidency of the Supreme Moslem Council, which administers Moslem religious affairs, and the chairmanship of the Higher Committee which opposes Jewish immigration.

During the general Arab strike, against Jewish immigration, these committees consolidated into what became the Arab Higher Committee.

It is composed of influential Arabs, including the Mayor of Jerusalem, demands the prohibition of Jewish immigration, a halt to transfer of Arab lands to Jews, and the establishment of a National Government responsible to a representative council.

GRAND MUFTI'S ARREST SOUGHT AT JERUSALEM

JERUSALEM, Oct. 2.—The Grand Mufti Spiritual head of 650,000 Arabs in Palestine and honored as a direct descendant of the Prophet was eagerly sought for arrest by British soldiers and police in Jerusalem tonight. The Arab disorders continue to grow showing every evidence of a serious and widespread plot. British troops are ready in Cairo to sail for Palestine at a moment's notice.

New Refrigerator Carriage For Perishable Freight

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 2.—With the object of providing more efficient refrigeration for the carriage of perishable traffic and have fresh foods reach their destination in as perfect a state as possible, a new type of refrigerator car has been developed by the Canadian National railways in co-operation with the Dominion Department of Agriculture at Ottawa.

One of these new type refrigerator cars arrived here this morning loaded with frozen fresh fish from Halifax, en route to Omaha, Nebraska.

Accompanying this car of fish are J. L. Townsend, general supervisor of perishable traffic and weighting, Canadian National railways, Montreal S.S., E. H. Young, one of the experts connected with the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa; C. P. Trites, regional supervisor of perishable traffic and weighting, Moncton; H. E. MacDonal, inspector of perishable traffic, Moncton.

This new type of refrigerator car has all the ice bunkers overhead whereas in the ordinary type of refrigerator car the bunkers are at either end. The new car is iced through trap doors let into the roof. Ice capacity is 6,500 lbs.

Tests go to show that the new refrigerator car provides a more uniform temperature throughout the interior of the car, it being possible, according to tests, to maintain the same temperature at the top and bottom of the car. The temperature inside the car of fish on arrival at Moncton was 10 above zero.

Tests are continuing in order to obtain more complete data.
