Now it can be reported here that an ambitious scheme is being formulated in the Capital whereby the initial work of the new trans-Canada airways system will be hastened in order to carry out a definite plan of the various Governments of the British Commonweath of Nations to unite all airlines of the Empire into a gigantic network which would link every corner where the British flag flies, crossing continents and oceans, and all of which would be of extreme importance.

It is also the duty of parents to inculcate in their children the thought that constitutional Government is a blessing and nothing is worse than upheaval which results from revolutionary motives. Although peace must not be secured at any price yet it is a far cry between constitutional liberty and dictatorship. "Long Live The Empire."



URGES CHURCH Basque Troops Are BACK ISSUES Ministers Should Help

TORONTO, May 21-The Church has a right to take a stand on public questions; and any minister can, by taking a side upon an important pub lic issue, often develop public opinion, declared Bishop F. J. McConnell, of New York, head of the Methodist Episcopal Church of United States addressing an interdenominational luncheon held yesterday at Metropol itan Church House. More than 200 representatives of Protestant churches were present at the luncheon held under the auspics of the Fellowship for a Christian Social Order.

The Church is an entity, not merely group meeting on a Sunday to worship God and it is entitled to a part in forming public opinion, pointed out Bishop McConnell. Remarking that the Church was doing very well and was becoming more and more informed daily on public issues, he commented: "The trouble with most of the leaders of reactionary groups today is that they are just plain dumb."




