N. B. BOYS TAKE PROMINENT PART IN TUXIS PARL'MT

WOLFVILLE, N. S., Dec. 31.—At yesterday's sessions of the 15th Maritime Tuxis and Older Boys' Parliament here, Allison London, Saint John premier, moved a resolution that the parliament go on record as opposed to human life being taken as a means of punishment and obtaining justice. Douglas Rouse, Fredericton, seconded the motion, which was passed. Allan Gibson, Wolfville, introduced a resolution, seconded by Lawrence Munde, Saint John, regarding the evils of alcohol, tobacco and immorality to the youth of the country and that the Three Cs program be stressed in the boys' groups.

After lively debate, Donald Thomas Saint John, minister of devotional affairs, moved an amendment that the Three Cs section be withdrawn, and that the resolution provide that the parliament lend aid to youth in a firm stand against these social evils. The amendment was seconded by Lawrence Hall, Fredericton, minister of world brotherhood, but was defeated and the original motion passed.

A resolution was passed urging boys classes in Sunday schools to register with the Maritime Boys' Work Board wherever possible. This was moved by the minister of organization, Neil Gaudet, Woodstock, and seconded by the leader of the opposition. A special feature of the afternoon was a talk by the special representative to the parliament, Kel Antof, a Danish boy, on "The Danish Hostel Association."

The reconstruction cabinet was selected, including the following from New Brunswick: Devotional Affairs, Donald Thomas, Saint John; World Brotherhood, Lawrence Hall, Fredericton; Provincial Secretary and Minister of Organizations, Neil Gaudet, Woodstock; Minister without Portfolio, Robert Watson, Fredericton.

Included in the forty delegates to the parliament were the following from New Brunswick: Linden Peebles, Douglas Rouse, Fredericton; Douglas Costello, Kenneth Logue, Frank Murchison, Glendon Vincent, Lawrence Munde, William Cox, St. John; Warren Colpitts, Sussex.

City Election

THE ELECTION FOR MAYOR AND ALDERMEN

FOR THE CITY OF FREDERICTON for the ensuing year will be holden on

MONDAY

the 10th day of January, 1938

at the Polling Places as follows:—

DIVISION NO. 1—For all voters residing or owning property above the northwest centre line of Carleton Street, prolonged, at or near the City Hall, in the said City.

DIVISION NO. 2—For all voters residing or owning property in the remainder of the City, at or near the County Court House, in the said City.

NOMINATIONS

Every candidate for the office of Mayor or Alderman shall be qualified to vote at the election for which he is nominated and shall be nominated by at least TWO ratepayers residing in the City of Fredericton, and qualified to vote at the ensuing election for which such candidate is nominated.

Every nomination paper, with the certificate of the City Treasurer, shall be filed with the City Clerk or at his office, and not later than FOUR O'CLOCK on the afternoon of MONDAY, the THIRD DAY OF JANUARY, 1938, and the City Clerk, before receiving such nomination paper, shall ascertain from the same that the requirements of the Election Act have been complied with.

No candidate is qualified to be nominated for Alderman unless at the time of nomination he is a resident of the Ward for which he is nominated.

The acceptance of each candidate and the signature of at least TWO resident qualified voters, who must sign the nomination paper, shall be proved by affidavit attached to the nomination.

In case of a contest, each elector shall be entitled to vote for one candidate for Mayor, for ONE candidate for Alderman for Wellington Ward, for ONE candidate for Alderman for St. Anne's Ward, for ONE candidate for Alderman for Carleton Ward, for ONE candidate for Alderman for Queen's Ward, and for ONE candidate for Alderman for King's Ward.
