Commence Work On Queen Street

Operations have been commenced on Queen Street, between the Post Office and Regent street in connection with the widening of the street for parking space. The wall, between the sidewalk and Canadian Legion grounds is being torn down and will be rebuilt in more substantial form. The work is under the direction of the City Engineer, and will be completed as soon as possible. The same fencing will be used. The curb and some piping will have to be removed, and the side of the street moved out to the sidewalk. The change will allow the cars to move ahead five or six feet, greatly improving parking conditions and traffic conditions on this section of Queen Street.

WIFE GOVERNOR-GENERAL LAUDS WORK OF N.B.W.I.

Pledges Whole-Hearted Co-operation--Other Matters

High tribute to the work of Women's Institutes throughout the Empire was paid by the Lady Tweedsmuir, wife of the Governor General of Canada in an address at the closing programme of the 24th annual conference of the New Brunswick's Women's Institute here yesterday afternoon. The distinguished lady discussed the growth of the institute movement in Great Britain after it had been introduced into the Mother Country from Canada.

The movement has completely revolutionized the social and cultural life in rural England and Scotland. Lady Tweedsmuir said, asserting that the work being carried on under the banner of the women's institute is invaluable. The speaker, herself a member of the institute, referred to the fact that Queen Mary and Queen Elizabeth are both actively interested in the movement. She discussed the contributions made by the Empire-wide organization, urging the members of the New Brunswick group to continue their splendid work and retain the high ideals and principles upon which the movement is founded.

Concluding her remarks, the distinguished visitor pledged her whole-hearted support to institute work throughout Canada. She also thanked the members for the kindness extended to her and pledged her friendship to all present.

Lady Tweedsmuir was accompanied by Miss Margaret MacLaren, daughter of Lieut.-Gov. MacLaren; Mrs. George Pape, a lady-in-waiting; Mrs. J. B. McNair, wife of the attorney-general and acting premier; Mrs. G. Willard Kitchen, wife of the mayor of Fredericton, and Major W. G. Jones, aide-de-camp.

Following Her Excellency's address Mrs. Robert Thompson, Chance Harbor, gave a talk on "Some Things of the Sea." She described many small sea creatures, such as shell fish, sea urchins, and sand dollar, and illustrated her address with specimens from the Bay of Fundy.

It was decided by the convention that the institutes should co-operate with organized Saint John groups in the establishment of a New Brunswick music festival. The remainder of the session was confined to the consideration of unfinished business and reports and the singing of various musical selections.

A greater amount of supervision over rural schools will be asked of the minister of education, it was decided this morning on motion of Mrs. W. H. Prescott, Bale Verte. Considerable discussion followed in favor of the additional supervisors being women, as it was felt that women teachers would be inclined more readily to bare their difficulties to members of their own sex.

TAXI DRIVER INJURED INTERNALLY IN CAR COLLISION HERE YESTERDAY

Condition Serious But Not Regarded as Dangerous CAR BURNED

Suffering from what is believed to be serious internal injuries, David Patterson, taxi driver of this city, is undergoing observations in the Victoria Public Hospital. Dr. A. L. Gerow, attending physician, stated today that his patient, through seriously injured, is in no immediate danger. The man received his injuries as a result of a car accident on the Woodstock Road yesterday afternoon when the car in which he was driving collided with another vehicle. It is believed that the impact threw the man out of the car onto the road when a front wheel of one of the cars passed over his body.

X-ray examinations revealed that he suffered no fractures although he was injured internally. The extent to which he was injured has not been definitely determined. Barring complications, the man will recover, medical attendants stated.

The accident occurred about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The taxi and an automobile driven by Osborne were in a collision at the junction of King Street, Brunswick Street and Woodstock Road. Osborne escaped in-

jury although his car was badly damaged.

Later in the afternoon a second accident occurred on the Woodstock Road when a car driven by William Scott, Southampton, N.B., caught afire while he was proceeding toward Fredericton. The flames enveloped the front of the car, endangering the life of the driver who was forced to leap for safety. The car swerved into the ditch and within a few minutes was a smoking heap of twisted metal.

THREE JUDGMENTS HANDED DOWN IN N. B. APPEALS COURT SESSION HERE TODAY

Amount Reduced in the Royal Bank vs. Port Royal Case

Judgment was rendered in favor of the plaintiff in the appeal in the case of the Royal Bank of Canada vs. the Port Royal Pulp and Paper Company when the June sitting of the Appeals Division of the New Brunswick Supreme Court was resumed here this morning. The judgment for about \$8,000 in favor of the plaintiff was reduced to \$192.99 with costs of action. The case was heard by Chief Justice Barry several months ago.

Two other judgments were handed down this morning. In the appeal of J. Byrne vs. the Prudential Life Insurance Company of America, the verdict previously entered for Byrne was set aside and verdict entered for the defendant with costs. The appeal of A. Clark from a judgment rendered in favor of the Roman Catholic Bishop of Saint John was allowed, and judgment entered for the plaintiff for \$500 with interest.

Chief Justice J. B. M. Baxter, Mr. Justice Grimmer and Mr. Justice Richards presided at this morning's session. Court was further adjourned until Tuesday, June 15th.

His Excellency, the Right Honourable Lord Tweedsmuir, Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief of the Dominion of Canada, and party, who paid an official visit to Fredericton yesterday left this morning for Saint John. They will be given a public reception there today.

There is no program arranged in connection with the departure of the vice-regal party. During their visit to the capital, the distinguished guests were given an enthusiastic reception by the citizens. They were guests at a public reception in the legislative building last night.

VICE-REGAL PARTY ENJOY FISHING AT HARTT'S POOL

Lord Tweedsmuir Spends Two Hours at Famous Resort

On the St. John River, six miles west of Fredericton, and directly opposite the site of the Indian village of Aukpaque, (head of the tide), where two centuries ago Malicet Indian warriors held their council meetings, settled their disputes, and allotted hunting territory, Lord Tweedsmuir, Governor-General of Canada, yesterday afternoon spent two hours whipping the waters of the Hartt's Island Pool for Atlantic salmon. His Excellency fished from a canvas canoe, skillfully handled for him by Percy Booth of this city, one of the guides employed at Pine Bluff Lodge, which the fishing party utilized as a base. Those who accompanied His Excellency on the fishing trip were His Honour Lieutenant-Governor MacLaren, with F. Cedric Cooper as guide, Lieutenant-Col. Mackenzie, with William Mooers as guide, Attorney-General and Acting Premier Hon. J. B. McNair with Charles Pitcher as guide, and Lieut.-Col. H. F. Morrissey, A.D.C., who had as guide Kenneth Rossborough.

The party left the city at three o'clock and motored to Pine Bluff Lodge, where six canoes were launched, five for the anglers and one to carry a motion picture camera and its operator, H. P. Beasley of Montreal. The canoes were poled up the western side of the river, and within the space of twenty minutes after leaving the Lodge were brought to anchor at a point directly opposite Savage Island, and the fishing began. A steady downpour of rain of course militated
