

Operations have been commenced on Queen Street, between the Post Office and Regent street in connection with the widening of the street for parking space. The wall, beween the sidewalk and Canadian Legion grounds is being torn down and will be rebuilt in more substantial form. The work is under the direction of the City Engineer, and will be completed as soon as possible. the same fencing will be used. 

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
