Long "old smoke" undergone such a thorough scrubbing and sprucing. Many buildings coated with accumulated grime of years have been transformed into spotless monuments by water and paint; festoons of varicolored bunting, flags of all days and heraldic crests are beginning to appear on every hand; merchants are vying with each other in display of patriotic emblems, foremost of which are pictures and souvenirs of the Royal family.

Similarly, private residences are being painted and renovated; light standards along the principal thoroughfares have been given a new coat of white and red paint and finishing touches are being put on temporary stands which will accommodate the throngs along the processional route.

Parliament Square has been one of the centres most affected. There the woodwork and scaffolding, skirting the Parliament Buildings and Westminster Abbey, fill the eye completely, except for the occasional statue which appears to stand boasting of its point of vantage.

In the Mall and along Whitehall Coronation masts, surmounted by gilded figures of lions, have been set in place. Elsewhere along the processional route work begun months ago is almost completed. Throughout this unprecedented preparation nothing is being left to chance.

Stands Carefully Tested

As temporary stands are erected they are given a thorough test against possibility of structural defects; more than 20,000 policemen have been carefully drilled for the task of controlling the crowds and to guard against any hitch in the Coronation procession.

Every unit destined to function in the general Coronation picture has undergone several rehearsals to ensure clockwork regularity. Coronation troops now quartered in the city have been taken on trial marches along the official route. Those entrusted with any part in the ceremony have undergone long hours of drilling. Horses that will draw the carriage and serve as mounts have been subjected to special training amid noise and excitement.

Even the King and Queen have rehearsed the formalities of the Coronation service in private.

Believed Meteor Hit Near Dumfries

It was proceeding toward the ground and, according to Mr. Morrison, there is but little doubt but that it struck the earth somewhere in the vicinity of Dumfries which is situated directly across the river from Bear Island.

WHITE'S COVE, Queens Co., April 29—The general store, house, woodshed and garage of Ray K. Orchard, White's Cove, was destroyed completely by fire early yesterday morning. The fire was discovered first by Mrs. J. W. White and Miss Beulah Miller who gave the alarm.

Neighbors rushed to give assistance, and help arrived from Upper James, Lower James, Robertson's Point and Waterboro. They managed to save only the barn by the aid of a truck hauling water.

Household effects were salvaged, but nothing was saved from the store except a barrel of oil and equipment for the post office, which was managed by Mr. Orchard.

It was not known exactly how the fire began, but as it originated in the store it was thought that mice had gnawed matches, causing them to ignite. There was some insurance on the house.

Canada's Poultry Exports Jump For Coronation Visitors

OTTAWA, April 29—Indicating the gastronomic welcome that awaits visitors to the United Kingdom this summer, Canada has doubled poultry exports in the first four months of the year.

Officials of the Agricultural Department say the increase is due to heavy purchases in anticipation of the Coronation trade, producing a paucity of domestic fowl.

Since Jan. 1, Canadian shipments to the British market have been 3,000,000 pounds, averaging ten to 12 cars a week. The nearer the Coronation approaches, the larger the demand is becoming.

NORTH TRANSVAAL.—A serious epidemic of malaria has broken out in the Transvaal. All hospitals are filled and in some cases whole families are confined.

These letters were in response to an invitation to appoint representatives from their organizations to the advisory board of the Home and School Association. Hoping thus to establish a council in the city. The support of the local teachers association was solicited in this regard and Mrs. A. R. Menzies reported having met the teachers the previous evening at their regular monthly meeting. The organization is now well established and its aim is to establish more enthusiasm in the welfare of youth educationally, mentally and physically. Letters have been received from the Fredericton National Council of Education, I.O.D.E., the W.I., the Children's Aid, the Science Club and other societies approving the work of the Association, others have promised to consider this at future meetings. Miss Hazel Milligan formerly head of the Industrial Department of a State College in Virginia told of her experiences in dealing with special classes in Randalls Island and in New York City. Miss Milligan told of the great work that was being done there with all classes of children of all types from morons and imbeciles to the highest type of educational achievement such as Helen Keller. Mrs. A. R. Menzies read an interesting article which had been delivered by Dr. Kenneth Rogers at the International Convention Association which was held in June, and which had been attended by Mrs. Menzies.

Kate Smith Six Years in Radio

This week marks the beginning of Kate Smith's seventh year in radio. When asked what special observance would mark her anniversary she replied, "It's not just my radio 'birthday.' You seem to forget that it will be Ted's sixth year just as much as it is mine."

Her own birthday, which falls, incidentally, on May 1, she is to spend quietly with her own family at their home near Washington, D. C. There won't be any radio fuss about it this year.

Kate pointed out, also, that Ted Collins, her manager, has been present at every one of her broadcasts, and that she has never made a professional appearance without him.

One spring night in 1930 Ted slipped a coin while waiting for a Long Island train, and "tails" decided that he should go to see a Broadway hit of that season, "Flying High."

For the first time he heard the rich voice of the girl who was, under his guidance, to sing her way into the homes and hearts of millions. Almost before the final curtain he was backstage, to arrange recordings for a phonograph company with which he was then associated. Less than a month later, he was Kate's manager.

Unique in the annals of this entertainment world is the fact that in all the time they have worked together, no written contract has existed between them.

In 1933, they formed the corporation Kated, Inc., issuing 100 shares of preferred stock shared equally by Kate, who is vice-president and Ted, who is president and treasurer.

One item not listed among Kate's corporation assets is the Original Cetics, privately purchased. It's only one of the many secondary common interests that are shared by Kate and Ted, who is a former Fordham University athlete.

Last year Kate's sponsors were so impressed by the naturalness and conviction of Ted's occasional announcements that they placed him under contract to add one more official duty to his various capacities. That makes him the only manager-producer-announcer in radio.
