Radiography of Andre Kostelanetz Orchestra

Andre Kostelanetz's orchestra is 37 average years old, a twenties of a mile high and weighs about three and a half short tons. . . . it has eyes of gray, blue, black, brown—and even green. . . . and hair of gray, brown, blonde, and black—but nary a red-head.

Its parental antecedents are of Roumanian, English, Italian, Russian, Greek, Belgian, Hungarian, Polish, and yet still over 80 per cent. American born. . . . Its members are drawn from those symphony orchestras—Warsaw, Berlin, Brussels, Philadelphia, Russian State Symphony, Cleveland, St. Louis, Detroit, Munich, Athens, and from many smaller classical musical organizations.

Its musical tastes range from Wagner, Bach, and Beethoven to popular numbers like "Sophisticated Lady," "St. Louis Blues," and "Stardust." Among its published compositions are those of maestro Kostelanetz, "Lake Louise," a harp solo; "Interlude," a song; and "Come to Me," a song with piano accompaniment. . . .

orig. Blumonte's saxophone solos, "Elephant and the Flea," "Scamps," Nicholas Kouloukis' "Reverie" and "Andante Arioso" for flute and piano. . . . Phil Wall's "Static Strut," "Cornfed," and "Tin-ear." Its best-loved operas are "Carmen," "Madame Butterfly," and "Tristan and Isolde"—or just about any other Wagnerian work. . . . More than 1,400 pages of manuscript are used for each broadcast. . . . Thirteen members of the orchestra have been concertmasters in famous orchestras and yet their average age is only 37. Kostelanetz himself being 35.

Guy Lombardo has become identified with the smoothest orchestral style on the air—BUT—among musicians brother Carmen, saxophonist, and Lebert, trumpeter, are known as two of the outstanding hot rhythm sections in the country.

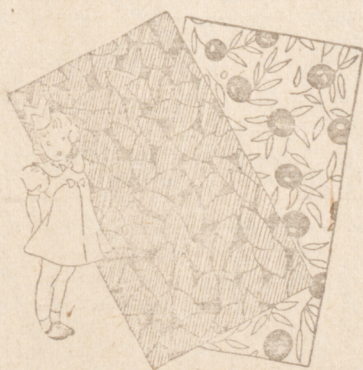
