# SNITE ENDS TRIP IN IRON LUNG

### Paralysis Victim in Chicago Hospital After 10,000-Mile Journey--May Be Cured in Seven Years

CHICAGO, June 25-Frederick B. Snite Jr., who has lived for fourteen months in an "iron lung," was installed in a specially air-conditioned room at Billings Memorial (Hospital after a halardous 10,000-mile trip from China.

"A re-enforced five-ton truck was waiting today as trainmen shunted the special observation car in which he made the trip from San Francisco off the main line and up to the railway express loading platform.

Five husky freight handlers, swiftly removed back partitions. Then, 28 minutes later and with three men on each side, the 600-pound "lung" and the youth inside, were wheeled down the runway and across the platform.

Just Needs American Food "He stood the trip in fine shape, his father said. "All he needed was to get back here and get some American cooking.

The elder Snite, wealthy president of a Chicago loan company, has been at his son's side constantly since he was stricken while on a world tour more than a year ago. Also in the party were his mother and his sister, Loretta Mary. A great-aunt, Mrs. Elizabeth Quigley, met him at the plat-form carrying flowers.

The unloading at the yard, carefully planned in advance, was accomplished without a hitch.

Four electric cables attached to powerful batteries in the truck were stretched across the platform to the respirator and were plugged in the instant current from the train was cut off. The huge "lung," which every four seconds forced air into the ending away from home, women are a beat

Physicians, it was reported, pin their hopes for his eventual recovery on a rare and delicate operation to join a living nerve to the respiratory system which was paralyzed by the disease. Even then, it is believed that at least seven years will be necessary before marked improvement occurs.

Some recovery already has been noted, his father said. He now is able to move his right leg and back slightly.

Letter of Stabilization Experts Published as Chautemps Cabinet Takes Office

FRENCH GOLD FUND NEARLY GONE

PARIS, June 26-Virtual exhausion of France's 10,000,000,000 franc (about \$450,000,000) gold (tabilization fund was disclosed today, indicating the gravity of the financial crisis which Premier Camille Chautemps's new Cabinet has been called on to solve.

"The stabilization fund soon will be obliged to call for gold from the Bank of France," Prof. Charles Rist and Paul Baudouin wrote in their joint letter of resignation from the fund management, its publication disclosed.

"Already for several weeks the di ectors have been powerless to relieve the pressure against it . Our daily meetings are of almost no further use," they said.

Prof. Rist and M. Baudouin, who esigned on June 15 from the comt nission appointed to govern the exchange equalization fund, explained today for the first time that they elieved the plan of former Finance Minister Vincent Auriol to raise 5,000,000,000 francs (about \$225,000,-000) from increased direct and indirect taxes would be "insufficient


