HOLLYWOOD RECREATES MANHATTAN CONVINCINGLY FOR FAMOUS PLAY

HOLLYWOOD, July 5—New Yorkers who like to go slumming should enjoy the forthcoming screening of Sidney Kingley's famous play, "Dead End," now in production with the original cast supplemented by some Hollywood box-office names.

Within the shadow of a huge gas storage tank and surrounded by bustling Hollywood, Richard Day has recreated Manhattan so convincingly that even saloons along the street have bartenders.

Day's tenement district looks authentic, but it about broke his heart to work it out within the confines of a huge sound stage. Director William Wyler wanted a complete river-front street in camera range three stories high, and with a good share of the river too, even including a tugboat.

Slums grow in 40 or 50 years but Day finished his in four weeks. The chief feature of the set is forced perspective and suggestion. The camera will show a dead end street, just as wide and long as the real New York article, but it's really narrower, the buildings and water tanks are smaller and the skyscrapers in the background are tiny. Everything is built to scale to give the illusion of size.

A 50,000 gallon tank filled with nine feet of water gives the suggestion of the river front, especially with a small wharf, moss covered piles and half a tugboat in view. That tugboat effect was realized by buying a tug at San Pedro harbor, cutting it in half and dropping the stern end in the tank. Insets of actual scenes from the real river, of river traffic and river front sounds will give an added touch of reality.

in their flight. Radio men said it differed from the carrier waves of ordinary stations and might be a voice carrier.

Voice Of Signals

The special radio equipment on Miss Earhart's plane was designed to transmit either voice or dot and dash signals, as desired. Pan American Airways radio, the Coast Guard station here, and the naval radio station all heard the signal but said it was too feeble to produce a directional bearing. Listeners also were uncertain as to whether it constituted the dash signals requested by KGMB.

Pending the arrival of the powerful aircraft carrier Lexington, the battleship Colorado and several destroyers, the little Coast Guard cutter Itasca resumed its single-handed search in the vicinity of Howland Island.

The destroyers Chandler and Southard received orders to sail from the California coast to the scene of operations.

SPECIAL SPEAKER

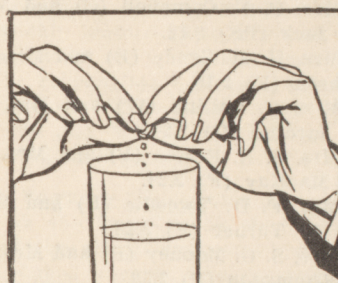

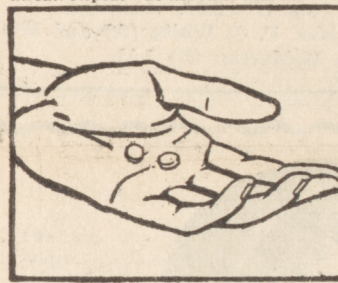
