Papers Begin Tomorrow Morning in All Parts of New Brunswick --- Total Number Students Writing Exams 1,577

Saint John Leads List With 352

There will be 188 students writing FIRE COMES TO examinations in Fredericton this week, including 74 writing matriculation, 24 high school leaving, 80 normal school entrance, and 10 for teachers' superior license. R. K. Nevers will supervise the writing of examinations here. He will be assisted by E. C. Close, David McFarane, Miss Pearl Ross and Miss Emma Betts. The exams commence omorrow.

Saint John has the largest number writing exams, the number totalling 352. Moncton ranks second with 196; Fredeircton is next with 188. The number writing matriculation examinations in Saint John and Moncton total 270 and 110, respectively. Fre ericton leads the list of those writing Normal School exams. Woodstock students writing examinations number 92, including 42 matriculaion, 16 high school leaving, four eachers' superior license, and 30 normal school entrance. Bathurst oupils writing exams totalled 87, while Chatham is 51.

The total number of students writing examinations is 1,577. The number includes: 854 matriculation; 253 Rev. T. H. Harrison Dies high school leaving; 64 teachers' superior license, the remainder being normal school entrance.
