COMMITTEE MEETING

The committee meeting of the City Council will be held tonight in the City Hall. One of the foremost topics of the meeting will be that of insect control in the city trees. Although no official confirmation could be given to the report, it is believed that the city intends taking measures to rid the city of the pests in the early fall, when their eradication is most easily attained.

Dr. A. R. Landry, F.R.C.S., Moncton, and Mrs. Landry were motor visitors to Fredericton yesterday. They remained here for a few hours, and after enjoying lunch at the Queen Hotel returned to the Hub via Saint John. Dr. Landry was prominently associated with medical investigation in connection with the Pacific Junction murder case in which the two Bannister brothers paid with their lives for the murder of Philip Lake.

Properties In Arrears Will Be Advertised

The finance committee of the city council decided to advertise for sale certain properties in the city in which the owners have not paid their taxes. The committee also decided to foreclose on other properties which were built under the Housing Plan and on which the payments have not been kept up. Action will also be taken to collect amounts overdue in connection with 'side-walk' taxes, most of which have been standing for several years. The two properties which had been advertised to be sold this morning for arrears in taxes were withdrawn as the owners previously made settlements.

MAPLE PRODUCERS MEET AT CAPITAL STATION JULY 9

An announcement that the New Brunswick Maple Sugar Producers' Association will have their annual field day and meeting at the Dominion Experimental Station on Friday, July 9, was made recently by President M. L. Dunphy, Royal Road, York county.

Plans are being made for a large number of the producers and their friends to come to Fredericton for the outing. Already Albert County producers have signified their intention of sending a larger gathering than last year when about 60 were present from various parts of the province.

Visitors will be welcomed by C. F. Bailey, superintendent of the station who has planned a tour around the farm for the morning entertainment so that the experiments, various branches of agricultural endeavor and stock on the farm may be seen by the producers. In the afternoon the annual meeting of the association will be held, and many of the producers will speak on the various phases of the industry.

It is hoped also that W. G. Clark, M.P., this city; J. K. King, deputy minister of agriculture; R. W. Butland, St. John, district fruit branch inspector, and others, will be present to speak to the producers.

BROTHER OF LOCAL MAN PASSES IN LOYALIST CITY

Rev. T. H. Harrison Dies In Saint John Hospital

Many friends in the vicinity of Fredericton will learn with regret of the sudden passing of Rev. T. Harry Harrison, which occurred yesterday in the Saint John General Hospital. He was well known in this district, having served the church for many years in the vicinity of Fredericton. Professor F. W. Harrison, who is prominently known in local musical circles is a brother of the deceased.

He was born at Sheffield, Queens County, on Oct. 18, 1860. For a long time he worked on his father's farm and later attended Mount Allison University, where he graduated with his bachelor of arts degree in 1893.

Having offered his life to the ministry he was ordained a minister of the Methodist church at the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference meeting at Marysville, the late Rev. Isaac Howie being the chairman, and the late Rev. Dr. Geo. Steele, secretary.

Mr. Harrison was of pre-Loyalist stock. He was known as a deeply sympathetic nature and entered with his whole heart in the various duties wherever his ministry took him. He was also an accomplished musician and singer.

He was twice married. His first wife, formerly Miss Eleanor F. Evans died in 1913, and he married his second wife, formerly Miss Julia M. Taylor of Sheffield in 1916. By his first wife he had four children, three sons and one daughter, and one daughter by his second wife, who survives him. These were Ernest Evans Harrison, who died in 1918; R. Coburn Harrison, Toronto, and Arthur T. G. Harrison, Saint John, and Mrs. Fred Williams, Moncton, and Miss Sara E. Harrison, at home.

In addition to his brother, F. W. Harrison of this city, he is survived by one sister, Miss Mary Harrison of Saint John.

The body will be brought to Fredericton tomorrow, for interment.

NEARLY TWO HUNDRED STUDENTS TO WRITE EXAMINATIONS HERE

Papers Begin Tomorrow Morning in All Parts
of New Brunswick ---Total Number
Students Writing Exams 1,577

Saint John Leads List With 352

There will be 188 students writing examinations in Fredericton this week, including 74 writing matriculation, 24 high school leaving, 80 normal school entrance, and 10 for teachers' superior license. R. K. Nevers will supervise the writing of examinations here. He will be assisted by E. C. Close, David McFarlane, Miss Pearl Ross and Miss Emma Betta. The exams commence tomorrow.

Saint John has the largest number writing exams, the number totalling 352. Moncton ranks second with 196; Fredericton is next with 188. The number writing matriculation examinations in Saint John and Moncton total 270 and 110, respectively. Fredericton leads the list of those writing Normal School exams. Woodstock students writing examinations number 92, including 42 matriculation, 16 high school leaving, four teachers' superior license, and 30 normal school entrance. Bathurst pupils writing exams totalled 87 while Chatham is 51.

The total number of students writing examinations is 1,577. The number includes: 854 matriculation; 253 high school leaving; 64 teachers' superior license, the remainder being normal school entrance.

The Program

The program for the papers is presumed to be the same as has been carried out in previous years. Seats will be assigned at 9 o'clock on Tuesday morning. At 9:30 the matriculation and High School leaving candidates will write English literature papers, Normal School entrance candidates, British and Canadian history and Superior license candidates, practical mathematics. On Tuesday at 2:30 p.m., the matriculation and High School leaving candidates will have Latin papers, Normal School entrance, arithmetic and Superior license, Latin.

On Wednesday at 9 a.m., matriculation candidates will write algebra and arithmetic papers; High School leaving candidates will write arithmetic, and Normal School entrance candidates, algebra. At 11:15 a.m. there will be chemistry papers for the matriculation and High School entrance candidates, and nature study and agriculture papers for the Normal School entrance candidates. All candidates will write English language and composition papers in the afternoon at 2:30.

On Thursday at 9 a.m., all candidates will write geometry papers. At 11:10 a.m., matriculation and High School leaving candidates will write physics examinations and Normal School entrance, geography. At 2:30 p.m., there will be history and geography papers for the matriculation and High School leaving candidates and writing and drawing for the Normal School entrance candidates. At 4:10 p.m., the Normal School entrance candidates will have the optional paper on French as their final examination.

On Friday at 8:30 p.m., both matriculation and High School leaving candidates will write either a French paper or a Greek paper. At 10:40 a.m., High School leaving candidates will write algebra and at 2:30 p.m., High School leaving candidates will have as their final paper, one on physiology.

The semi-annual meeting of the York County Municipal Council will open in the courthouse here tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. The sessions will continue until Saturday morning. Warden Frank Coburn will preside and it is expected that all councillors will be present.

Although no official statement has been given by Secretary-Treasurer Scott regarding the matters on the agenda of the meeting, it is understood that questions of considerable importance will be dealt with. The proposed changes in the division of the county for tax collecting purposes will be one of the main topics under discussion. It is also likely that consideration of the parish system, where each parish collects its own taxes, be changed to one of a county unit for assessing and collecting taxes for the operation of the municipality.

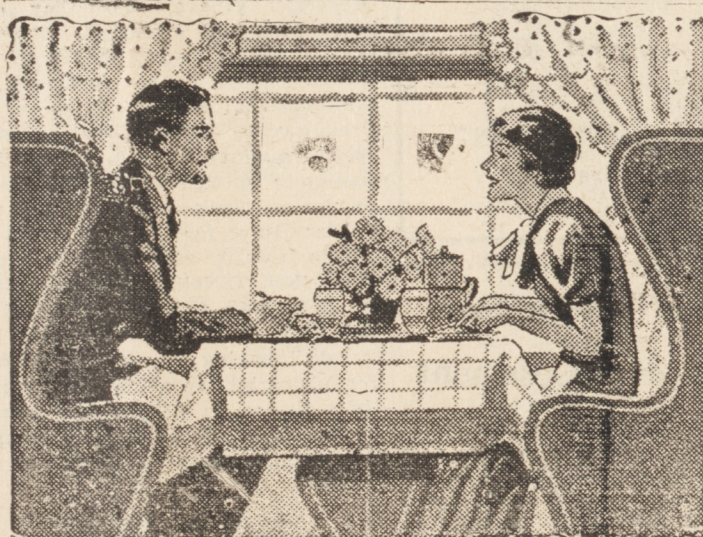
